The following is taken from the Greenwood Central School Principal's Newsletter.

This year begins a New Year and a year that I suppose could be a bad year if the economic picture doesn't get any better.

At the time this is being written the State is giving consideration to taking away some of our 1975-76 state aid, which to say the least would be a grave problem to us if that were to happen.

Once the New Year begins we have to start thinking about budget for 76-77 which gets to be a difficult crystal ball to read each year.

To try and keep ourselves up-to-date and the public up-to-date, as I was to tell our story and listen to the public, we are going to hold meetings with staff and the public to try our best to build a budget for 76-77 that does the very best possible for our students and still meets with the approval of the taxpayers in our district.

We are most fortunate this year to have two winners in the Regents Scholarship program and an alternate in the Regents Nursing Scholarship program.

The winners are: Denise Smith Hoyt, a senior, married to Ronald Hoyt, and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Smith of R.D. 1 Reville.

Laura Wright, a senior, and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Wright of Greenwood.

The alternate in the Regents Nursing Scholarship program is Debbie Cook, a senior, and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rodney Cook of Greenwood.

Each scholarship is worth \$250 per year for up to four years.

The alternate scholarship will be awarded to Debbie if any of the winners in the nursing program do not use their scholarship.

NOTICE:

Pursuant to an order of the Public Service Commission, we are filing tariff provisions governing our policies for requiring deposits from residential customers. We may require deposits from residential customers on the basis of credit risk standards. An existing residential customer may be considered a bad credit risk and be required to make a deposit if he has been delinquent in payment two or more times in a recent twelve-month period or has had his telephone service disconnected for nonpayment in the preceding twelve months. A new residential customer may be considered "non-credit rated" and be required to make a deposit if he cannot provide three positive answers to six questions designed to establish credit worthiness. We may alternatively consider, when available, a new residential customer's past payment experience with a New York utility rendering the same type of service and may require a deposit if the customer has been delinquent in payment twice in a recent twelve-month period with the other utility or has been disconnected for nonpayment by the utility in the preceding twelve months.

We will review the status of our held deposits by April 1, 1976 and refund deposits to qualified residential customers. Thereafter, we will review the status of residential accounts which are secured by deposits on at least an annual basis and refund deposits accordingly.
