Pursuant to an order of the Public Service Commission, we are filing tariff provisions govern-ing our policies for requiring deing our policies for requiring deposits from residential customers. We may require deposits from residential customers on the basis of credit risk standards. An existing residential customer may be considered a bad credit risk and be required to make a deposit if he has been delinquent in payment two or more times in a recent twelve-month period or has had his telephone service disconnected for nonpayment in the preceding for nonpayment in the preceding twelve months. A new residential customer may be considered "noncredit rated" and be required to make a deposit if he cannot procredit rated" and be required temake a deposit if he cannot provide three positive answers to six
questions designed to establish
credit worthiness. We may alternatively consider, when available,
a new residential customer's pastpayment experience with a New
York utility rendering the same
type of service and may require
a deposit if the customer has been
delinquent in payment twice in a
recent twelve-month period with
the other utility or has been disconjected for nonpayment by the
utility in the preceding twelve
months.

We will review the status of out
held deposits by April 1 1976 and
refund deposits to qualified residential cusomers. Thereafter, we
will review the status of residential accounts which are secured by deposits on at least an
annual basis and refund deposits
accordingly.
