### Robert Pfuntner Seeks Nomination For Congressman

ALLEGANY COUNTY LEGISLATOR, Robert James Pfuntner has announced his intention to seek the Republican Nomination for the Congressional Seat being vacated by Congressman James F. Hastings.

Mr. Pfuntner, who was elected to the county legislature in 1974, in his first bid for public office said that he feels "very strongly" that "someone from the center of the Congressional District should be considered for this position."

"Bob" noted that Congressman Hastings himself is a resident of Allegany County and that "having the congressman living in the center of the 39th District is good for everyone concerned." "I am concerned that thus far the only Republican Candidates mentioned have been persons who, though they may be well qualified, live at one end of the district or the other." "While there is nothing wrong with this, I think the Congressman should represent the entire district, as Jim Hastings has been doing so well and so effectively."

"Allegany County isn't the most heavily populated area of the 39th Congressional District, but it is the center, and a Congressman from this large district who lives in the center, could easily maintain contact and communications with the entire district more easily than someone living in one of the far corners could."

Mr. Pfuntner said also that he feels he has "a real opportunity to gain the nomination, since Allegany County has a large share of the Republican Voters in the overall district." He noted also that he feels that he is close to the people, and as a local businessman is in daily contact with hundreds of them. As President of an Upstate Radio Station, he is aware of what the people truly want and need in their congressman. Before he was elected to the legislature, he was active in many local organizations and feels he has a good "input" from the people who need strong local representation in Washington.

Mr. Pfuntner said that if he gains the Republican Nomination, and is elected, he would be a candidate for re-election at the November Congressional Election.

### Alfred Ag-Tech Offers Basic Scuba Diving Course

A basic scuba diving course for students and area residents will be offered Sunday evenings starting in February at the State University Agricultural and Technical College at Alfred.

The 10-week course, which will cost \$45 for 30 hours of instruction, will be taught by Dr. James Rausch of Alfred who is certified by the National Association of Underwater Instructors (NAUI).

An orientation and swim session for persons interested in the course is planned for 7 p. m. Sunday, February 15, according to Greg Spradling, Alfred State College swimming coach and assistant instructor in the course.

Spradling said classes will meet from 7 p. m. to 10 p. m. Sundays in the college's student activities center.

The 30 hours of instruction will include 10 hours of lectures and 20 hours in the swimming pool, while an additional part of the course will be two training dives at Conesus Lake.

Dr. Rausch, who has been diving for 12 years, is an assistant professor of biology at Alfred University and has been involved in marine biology programs in Key West and Big Pine Key in Florida. Additionally, he conducts a marine biology course for the university on the Island of San Salvador in the Bahamas every January.

Spradling said those wishing to enroll in the basic scuba diving course must meet these requirements: be able to swim 300 yards non-stop; tread water for 15 minutes; swim 25 yards underwater; swim 25 yards with a 10-pound weight; demonstrate a surface dive be cleared by a physician; and have parental consent if under age 18.

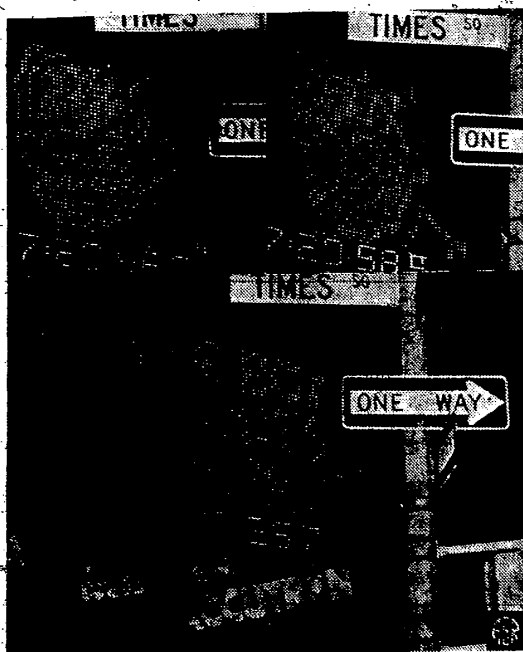

### How To Improve Home Lighting, Cut Cost

Homes of the future, say lighting experts, may well be illuminated with highly efficient light sources which will last 10 to 20 times longer than today's household incandescent bulbs.

They will substantially reduce hard shadows and will bring out the color vibrance of interior walls and draperies as well as floor and furniture coverings.

When will these sources be available? They are right now, according to Nancy Christensen, lighting specialist for the General Electric Company. They're called fluorescent tubes.

"There's no big technological breakthrough needed to adapt fluorescent lighting for use in the home. All that is needed is for consumers to recognize its advantages."

Ms. Christensen says many consumers still think of fluorescent lighting in connection with stores and offices, and that fluorescent tubes give off an unflattering blue-white light.

"When fluorescent lights were first introduced in 1938, this was the case," she says. "But today deluxe fluorescent tubes actually enhance flesh tones and all colors in the home."

Deluxe cool white tubes especially complement "cool" colors such as blue or green, while deluxe warm white tubes are generally preferred in rooms dominated by browns, yellow, red or wood tones. Deluxe warm white fluorescents blend well with incandescent lighting to achieve a warm, "homey" environment.

From a more practical stand-

point, Ms. Christensen says, fluorescent tubes provide three times as much light as incandescents for the same wattage and they last up to 5 to 6 years in normal usage.

GE lighting specialists recently designed a lighting system for a three-bedroom, three bath home, using fluorescents as the main light source in every room, with incandescents for "accent" lighting. The system resulted in an estimated 45% electricity cost savings over a comparable all-incandescent system.

Deluxe warm white fluorescent tubes can be used in every room in the house, Ms. Christensen says. Installed under kitchen cabinets, they provide nearly shadow-free lighting for food preparation. Over the cabinets, they give the kitchen soft general illumination.

In living, dining, family of bedrooms, fluorescent lights installed in valances or soffits provide a balanced general illumination which can be supplemented by incandescent lighting to provide decorative accents or supplemental reading light. The addition of fluorescent dimming devices in these rooms make a fluorescent system even more flexible.

Deluxe warm white fluorescent tubes installed over and around the bathroom mirror helps give your skin a healthy glow and provides nearly shadow-free lighting for applying makeup or shaving.

In terms of lighting, the home of the future is available now for those who want it.
