### Grocery Gems & Goodies

Hi Folks! For a change we have some good news, as the price of butter and several other items are on the decline. Butter dropped 25 to 27¢ a pound over night with no explanation of such a fantastic drop. Of course, no one could explain why it climbed to where it was over the past few months so that makes it par for the course. One large producer stated that November and December were big months for usage and that there wasn't enough fluid milk produced or enough in storage to meet this heavy demand. And, like everything else, when something becomes scarce — then the prices are jacked up until the consumer revolts, stops buying — supply builds up, and the price has to be lowered to move them along again.

However, someone has to take the lead in setting price raises and we heard one story of a recent butter deal: that it is done by a select few who get-together to decide on a price, and then publish it known as the Chicago Market and the New York Market, and this sure seems like price fixing. Who are these people — anyone know?

Other items that are currently on the decline are sugar, flour, and the oil market. In the meat line, Beef is plentiful; Pork is light with production about 20% below the '73-'74 average; Broilers — Fryers are plentiful with Turkey supply adequate; and Eggs are adequate. Fresh Apples are plentiful and crop is forecast at 13-17% above '72-'74 average. Citrus Fruits and Juices are plentiful as well as Raisins and Dried Prunes. Canned and Frozen Vegetables are plentiful with stocks ranging from 11 to 14% above '72-'74 average with fresh Potatoes at an adequate level. Under Grains and Legumes, Rice, Dry Beans, Oats, Wheat and Corn are all plentiful with production ranging from 14% to 32% over the '72-'74 average.

Thus the picture for the New Year is fairly bright as far as the House Wife and her grocery shopping is concerned.

This Week's Specials in the Meat line include: Ground Beef at 99¢; Ground Chuck at 89¢; and Boneless Chuck Roast at \$1.09 per pound. Red & White Bacon is 99¢ for a 12-oz. pkg.; and their Luncheon Meats are \$1.09 a lb. for 9 varieties. Kraft Miracle Whip Salad Dressing is 89¢ a qt. R & W Salad Oil is 79¢ for a 1 pt. 3-oz. bottle. Crisco is \$1.29 for a 3-lb. can, and Pillsbury Flour is \$2.79 for a 25 lb. bag.

In the Produce Department, Florida Temple Oranges are 69¢ a doz. Tomatoes are 49¢ for a tub of 4; California Green Onions are 49¢ for a 5-lb. bunch; and Idaho Potatoes are 49¢ for a 10-oz. pkg.; and Ida Red or Red Rome Apples are 49¢ for a 3-lb. bag.
