In his "State of the State" message several weeks ago, Governor Carey spoke these words, in referring to the cuts and sacrifices...

I shall be mindful of those who have already felt the effects of the austerity measures of the year past. Too much of a sacrifice it is said, can make a stone of the heart.

Well, no one would particularly like to accuse our Governor of a heart of stone. However, it appears that once again his words may float into the politically-charged atmosphere of the state...

Last week Mr. Carey took many people by surprise in admitting that he was changing his position on more taxes for our State and shifting his entire emphasis on deep spending cuts.

In advocating cuts in local aid formulas and state monies for local school districts, of course, the Governor is accomplishing nothing. There are those who would insist that his motive is to "throw the ball" in the Legislature's court...

This column is being written prior to the release of the 1976-77 proposed budget by the Governor so it is difficult now to be specific. However, we already know that the Governor plans to cut funds...

Last year, it took a tremendous effort on the part of Republican lawmakers to get money restored to the "Donovan Road Plan" which the Governor's staff had cut -- to the tune of nearly \$2 million. Now it looks like the battle is on again.

Meanwhile, reports are circulating that cutbacks in construction and reconstruction of state highways, especially in upstate areas, will be devastating on our rural areas.

Thus it is the familiar pattern of 1975 when the Governor announced his "spending cuts" and they affected such areas as state police, correctional facilities, and parks and recreational locations.

When the pressure comes to restore money, the so-called "cuts" in the budget are diminished and
