The problem with this approach of course, is that if these roads are allowed to deteriorare over several years, it will cost a creat deal more to replace or repair them in the long-run than it would to do the smaller patching lobs now. Meanwhile, as the roads deteriorate, so will the sattery on these highways. ty on these highways.

Thus it is the tamiliar pattern of 1975 when the Governor armounced his "spending cuts" and they affected such areas as state police, correctional facilities, and police, correctional facilities, and parks and recreational locations. These are the cuts which really lurt and they are the kind of cuts which force local governments and constituents to bring pressure on legislators by restore the money.
