Calkins Pledges Service To Veterans

Jack Calkins, Republican/Conservative candidate for Congress in the March 2nd Special Election, told an informal gathering of the Cheshire County Veterans that his door will always be open to 39th District veterans with problems. Calkins told the luncheon gathering at the Connecticut Yankee Lounge in Elmhurst that he would work to maintain benefit levels for disabled veterans and that he would strongly oppose any efforts by the federal government to tax disability compensation.

"I intend for my office to be a service office for all constituents," Calkins said. "It is often difficult for a citizen to deal with federal bureaucracy and I plan to be a red tape cutter for veterans and all other residents who are frustrated by inactivity and delays from Washington."

The informal gathering of veterans was coordinated by Earl Karam, Commander of the Cheshire County Disabled Veterans and John G. O'Leary. Karam said that Mr. Calkins seemed very receptive to their needs and pointed to the outstanding services provided by Congressman Jim Hastings in the past.

Calkins told the veterans that he wants to continue to guarantee that hard-earned and richly deserved benefits are provided to the

people who gave so much to their country. "In our time today," Calkins said, "the largest concern was with federal bureaucrats toying with veterans' benefits. Following the March 2nd election, I want to work to see that this does not happen."

Local Student Selected For European Concert Tour

Melody Crittenden, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Crittenden Andover, New York, has been selected to participate in the "America's Youth in Concert" 1976 program sponsored by the Universal Academy for Music, Princeton, New Jersey. The purpose of the program is to demonstrate internationally the high quality and fine character of American youth while enriching and expanding the musical and cultural horizons of the young musician.

Students are selected for "America's Youth in Concert" after participation in a nation-wide audition. The 1976 program promises to be an exceptional one with a Philadelphia Bicentennial Committee invitation to perform on the 200th Birthday of the Nation's founding and then a New York City performance at Carnegie Hall prior to European departure. The students will concertize in London, Paris, Geneva, Innsbruck, Venice, Florence and Rome.

The "America's Youth in Concert" 1976 program will consist of two groups: each group will have a Concert Choir, Concert Band and a Symphony or Chamber Orchestra. The departure dates are June 29th and 30th for a month's tour. The young musicians will perform under the baton of outstanding university conductors while the chaperone staff consists largely of music educators from many different areas of the country.

Some notable performance locations in the past have been the White House and John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D. C. The Royal Albert Hall, London, Notre Dame Cathedral, Paris, Doge's Palace Venice, and the Vatican in Rome.

Melody is a Sophomore at Andover Central School, where she is active in Senior Band, Marching Band, Dance Band. She plays Alto Saxophone, under the direction of Mrs. Nancy Potter. She has participated in All-County Band for three years, and Area All-State Band one year. She has attended Bristol Hills Music Camp at Canandaigua, New York for two years.
