Career Ed

Andover Central School is one of the participating schools in the Career Education Program sponsored by Allegany County. This program calls for more widespread education in the class room concerning job opportunities, professions, and careers available now and in the future. It opens the eyes of the student to the variety of occupations and sparks interest in various areas of the working world.

Career Education in the elementary grades at ACS is proving exciting and interesting for the students. For instance, the Kindergarten Class has done a unit concerning the profession of bricklaying, discussing and demonstrating the basic processes involved. They also have assembled a display case depicting the occupation. The First Grade did a colorful survey of a hospital helpers unit. In so doing, they made hats and other projects characteristic of nurses and doctors. The Second Grade simulated a department store in order to explore the duties of clerks and cashiers and the organization of store business. In the Third Grade, the students made a bulletin board depicting a number of occupations including plumbers, actors, dieticians, morticians, bookkeepers, and others. The third graders then found pictures of people in these fields and placed them next to their proper occupation. The Fourth Grade role played as designers in the way of interior design for housing. Each student was given an area of a house and the division of the rooms on each floor. Then each was required to place in the appropriate room, the furnishings that the class agreed was found in those rooms. The Fifth Grade explored the world of skiing, taking the role of the instructor and also viewing the occupation of a salesman. Meanwhile, the Sixth Grade paralleled their history with career education. They constructed a Medieval Manor consisting of the castle, village, serf residences, and the characteristics of the manor structure.

The Junior and Senior High Classes have also been doing class-related activities concerning careers. The Junior High Social Studies classes have done a unit in labor including the discussion of fringe benefits, labor acts, and the effect of these on job opportunities. They have also studied the cities of the state and their products through which available occupations have been cited. In Home Economics, home occupations such as cooking, sewing, and babysitting are practiced. Industrial Arts classes have explored metal working, electricity and communications and wood working.

Senior High activities and other Junior High career education activities include studies of local government, court systems, a lecture by Judge Serra, a tour of the County Courthouse and the Department of Motor Vehicles, plans to visit a session of the Legislature, comparisons of Medieval guilds with today's labor unions, typing business letters, business law including checks, drafts and promissory notes, and banking occupations.

Also in line with career education are housekeeping and motherhood in high school Home Economics classes, math required for engineering, nursing and architectural occupations, Spanish vocabulary for occupational and everyday use, blueprint reading, drafting, energy consumption, job availability and a thesis on future careers. The English department has organized activities leading to the understanding of book publishing, poetry and composition and the putting together of stories.

Science classes explored research positions such as neurology, astronomy, meteorology, and map reading. Art classes have applied their field of study to occupations such as textile design, illustration jewelry design and have received individual guidance according to their strengths.

All in all, ACS has been very active in Career Education.
