## Panther Prowl Varsity Basketball

On February 17 the Varsity basketball team suffered another one of its 8 losses of the season. Houghton defeated the Purple Panthers 65-79. Andover fell behind early in the game and never regained enough momentum to take over the lead. Andover, only down by two points 23-26, at the half time, slacked off towards the end of the game to lose it 65-79.

Scorers for Andover were Doug Preston and Dale Russell with 15, 12 points respectively. Jay MacMichael shipped in 8 points.

On February 20, Andover defeated Rushford in a close contest. The game went into a see-saw motion throughout the whole game. Andover fell behind by one point at the half, 32-31. Andover took the lead in the third quarter by four points, 51-47, the game was a very close contest in the fourth as the lead changed hands many times only to find Andover on top at the end of the game by one point 68-67.

High scorers for Andover were Doug Preston with a game high of 27 points; Scott Wilson and Jay MacMichael pitched in 12 points apiece, with Dale Russell adding 11 points to aid our win.

Andover traveled to Richburg to play the last game in our regular season. Andover ended the season on a winning note as we defeated the Bearcats 67-55. The game was not a close one as we led at the half-time 32-19. Andover maintained this lead through out the second half to win it by 12. Andover had two players with hot hands as Doug Preston and Dale Russell added 21, 29 points respectively, to Andover's win.

On March 6, Andover made it to Quarter Finals in the Section V Class D Playoffs, only to be defeated by Scio by a margin of 21 points. It seemed as though no one had a good day as our high scorer was Dale Russell with 10 points and Tim Mead with 9, coming off the bench. Scio seemed to dominate the whole game as they never trailed. The half-time score was 39-27 a comfortable margin for Scio. Scio hung on to win the game by 21 points, 70-49.

## J.V. Basketball

Catching up on some back J. V. basketball games, I will go back to February 10, Andover played Whitesville at Whitesville. This game had its up and downs for Andover. The Panthers were ahead at the end of the first quarter by the margin of 15-8, by the half-way mark the Panthers had the lead cut down to 5 points with the score 27-22 in favor of Andover. Andover fell down to the Whitesville Blue Jays defense as we only scored 12 points in the third quarter to Whitesville's 26. This brought the score to 46-39. Whitesville in the lead. Whitesville seemed to hold on to its lead throughout the fourth quarter to win the contest by 11 points 66-55.

Scorers for the game were Marty Geer with 16 points, Steve Dibble with 15 point exhibition, and Tracy Preston, Pat Atwell and Doug Welch with 15, 14, 3 points respectively.

The Panthers took a command of the game from the very start by tripping out to a 17-8 lead at the first quarter mark. The Panthers led at the half by the score of 33-25. Andover's lead widened at the third quarter mark by 15 points

The score at this point was 52-37, but Andover didn't lay back and take it easy with this lead. Belmont got things rolling in the fourth quarter to manage a 22 point effort. Andover hung on by matching Belmont with a 28 point fourth quarter spurge.

Leading scorers for Andover were Steve Dibble and Marty Geer with a fine showing of 24 points apiece, and Tracy Preston, Charlie Weber and Pat Atwell with 12, 8 and 7 points respectively.

But several teachers have also attended Career Education Workshops, or are doing something special in the classroom. At 9:30, John Hogle spoke, Career Education Director of Niagara - Orleans BOCES. Then after a brief group exercise was a Role Group Session with Administrators, Guidance and Teachers to discuss needs Assessment, Roadback and Solutions and Problem Solutions in local Districts. At 11:30 till Noon was a large group sharing. The main activities in the afternoon were the rotation groups, small groups in which their presentors shared ideas of Career Education activities.

The first group concerned activities and ideas for grades K-6. Its presentors were Mrs. Lyn Griffiths and Mrs. Lori McGivern, fourth grade teacher at Belmont. Group two was concerned with Career Education for Jr. and Sr. High. Mrs. Rosemary Burger was the presenter for this group, sharing a slide presentation and discussing the many activities taking place in Andover concerning Career Education. She explained that Career Education intertwines with regular events that go on all the time, for example one student, having been on Library Council, has gone in to work in a library, having the experience to do so. Mrs. Burger also explained, that through Career Education, teachers are trying to instill in students an awareness of career opportunities in the outside world.

The third group was concerned with the Organization of Career Education in an Elementary Program. Presentors were Mr. Ken Jones, Elementary Principal, at Cuba Central School and Mrs. Polly Weart, Elementary Supervisor and Music Instructor also at Cuba.

Group Four was concerned with Career Education and Implementation in Niagara-Orleans BOCES. John Hogle, the Director there, was presenter for this group, along with Pam Serio, Career Education Coordinator, at Allegany County BOCES. She also coordinated the days activities, that ended with a short film at 3:00.

## Immunization Clinics

Mrs. McCormick wanted your recognition of the Board of Health meeting which was held December 18, 1975. This department will no longer furnish the annual immunization clinics to the schools as of January 1, 1976.

The new law states that all children entering school should be adequately immunized. The next immunization is not due until the ninth of fourth grade.

Ninth or tenth graders, and transfer students may use the clinics if they cannot receive services from a private physician. If the child is not accompanied by a parent he or she needs a signed parental consent and a record of previous immunizations.

There is an immunization clinic in Wellsville the fourth Wednesday of each month from 2 to 4 p. m. at the Jones Memorial Hospital Room 15.

Mrs. McCormick will be checking the files to see if there are any children who have not had their Measles Shots. She will also check to see how many children had their shots before 1976. If there are a sufficient number of children that need to be vaccinated there will be a clinic held.
