## Large Furn-out At "Festival **Public Meeting** Discuss Projects

Over 80 residents of the Town and Village of Andover attended the public meeting held at the Andover Central School, Sunday afternoon to discuss the possibility of Federal Funding for community

of Federal Funding for community projects.

The meeting, sponsored by the Andover Chamber of Commerce was chaired by fifts. Bernard Burger, Chamber of Commerce President. Kenneth Boberts, representing Southern Tier West Begional Planning and Development Board, spent neary two hours outlining and explaining the different possibilities and proceedures that are required in applying for Federal Funding for local Community projects.

Fellowing this, it is necessary to select a committee of interested citizens to work out the necessary details for the initial application for Federal Funds ence priorities have been established and agreed upon.

Following the presentation by Mr. Roberts, the floor was opened to questions and discussions. Richard Schrader, President of the Andover Volunteer Fire Department and spokesman for the group of Firemen in attendance, stated that the present Fire Hall was in a pour state of co idition which made it rather difficult to take care of the necessary maintenance of nour state of co dition which made it rather difficult to take care of the necessary maintenance of equipment that is vital to efficient operation. He said that the money received from the Village and Town for Fire Protection was only sufficient to replace and maintain Fire Fight equipment with nothing left over to add to the building fund which had been started in previous years when prices were much lower. He turther explained that the Fire Department realized that it would be difficult for them to fund a new Fire Hall and that they would be willing to share a Community Type building as long as they could secure and protect their equipment if Federal Funds were available for this type of project.

During the general discussion other community needs were brought out including the upgrading of the water system and a possible sewage disposal system.

One comment videod during the meeting was a suggestion that the community conduct a "do-tt-your-selves" campaign and false the funds locally. However, it was pointed out that the Village is already under a Bond Issue for \$100,000 for a new Electric Substation that is currectly under construction which will raise local electric rates. Moreover, with sky-rocketing costs, the Village Street Maintenance plan is practically at a stand-still; and the water system needs to be upgraded so, that all subscribers can have sufficient water supply and pressure for their needs.
