The seventeenth is here, the day on which all those who have survived the Ides of March become Irish. St. Patrick's Day, how did this tradition and all its symbols come into being? Let's look back.

St. Patrick was born in Bannavem about 389. At the age of 16 he was captured by Irish pirates. Once in Ireland he was employed as a shepherd to an Ulster Chieftan. After six years, during which he became Christian, he escaped to France. There he became a monk. In 432, prompted by a vision, he returned to Ireland as a missionary bishop.

Many legends have sprung up about him. One of the best known is that he charmed the snakes of Ireland down to the seashore so that they were driven into the water and drowned; another that he used a Shamrock to symbolize the trinity.

Since his death in 461, he has been remembered. Special apparel, flowers, shamrocks and greeting cards have commemorated this holiday. March 17 is celebrated by a flood of blarney and the wearin' of the green.
