St. Patrick was born in Bannavem about 389. At the age of 16 he was captured by Irish pirates. Once in Ireland he was employed as a shepherd to an Ulster Chieftan. After six years, during which he became. Christian, he escaped to France. There he became a monk. In 432, prompted by a vision. he returned to Ireland as a missionary bishop. He worked there throughout the islend for the rest of his life, founding over '160 churches and baptizing more than 120,000 persons. It is said of him that he "found Ireland all heathen and left it all Christian".

Many legends have sprung up about him. One of the best known is that he charmed the snakes of Ireland down to the scashore so that they were driven that he waster and drowned another, that he used a Sharmack, to symbolize the trinity.
