

Village Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees was held in the Village Office, Monday evening, February 11, 1976 at 7:30. Those present: J. Michael Brace, Mayor; Harold Rice, Avery Mead and Paul Hyland, Trustees; David Rosman, Acting Working Supt. Mr. and Mrs. Lynn Sherwood, Ralph Allen, Gerald Hann, and Glenn Bronson, and Gabe Karolyi, Engineer.

Minutes of the meeting held January 14th were read and approved on a motion made by Harold Rice and seconded by Avery Mead.

Gabe Karolyi, engineer, was present to give a report on the progress of the Sub-Station. Harold Rice and Gabe Karolyi met with a contractor as to the installation of the steel. They feel that this could be done the first part of April, weather permitting. The materials at the sub-station were inspected and are all set for installation. There will be a special Board meeting on Monday, February 23 with Mr. Karolyi for discussion of a rate increase and information needed for the Power Authority to obtain said increase.

Gerald Hann, representing the American Legion was present to present the Village with a Bi-Centennial Flag to be flown on the Island Flag Pole for the remainder of 1976.

Mr. and Mrs. Lynn Sherwood and Harold Huffcut were present to request the Village to make repairs on the road to Fairview Avenue. This matter was tabled for further investigation.

Mike Smith was present to request the Village to install a water line and service to his barn located off Route 417 on the Lynch Road and to repair an Electric Service line which is hanging low across his property, and to repair a sluice pipe into his driveway on the same property.

Glenn Bronson, insurance agent for the Village was present to explain the coverage that we have with his company, which he feels is sufficient in most cases. Moved by Avery Mead and seconded by Paul Hyland to increase our property damage limits on Village owned vehicles from \$10,000 to \$100,000.

Ralph Allen was present to give a report on the Bi-Centennial Committee and its progress. Application has been made to the American Revolution Bi-Centennial Administration and 19 members of different organizations in Andover and Wellsville are on the committee. A list of activities for the year 1976 was submitted as the annual Maple Festival sponsored by the Andover Lions Club. Annual 4th of July celebration and Harvest Home Week by Presbyterian Church and Chamber of Commerce.

Moved by Avery Mead and seconded by Paul Hyland for Mayor Brace and Trustee Rice to attend a meeting concerning the railroad to be held in Hornell on Tuesday, February 17th.

Moved by Paul Hyland and seconded by Harold Rice to appoint Rickey Timothy and James Brundage as crossing guards under the jurisdiction of the Police Department while on crossing duty.

The Village Board will meet with Al Winslow on February 21, 1976, at 10 A. M., for the purpose of inspecting the trees between the curbs and sidewalks.
