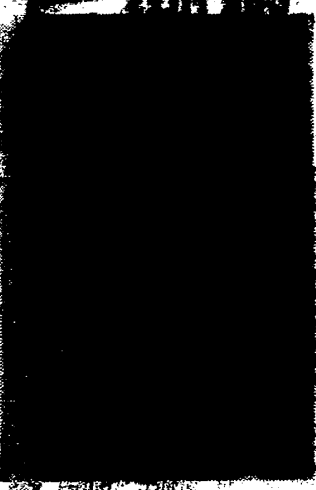


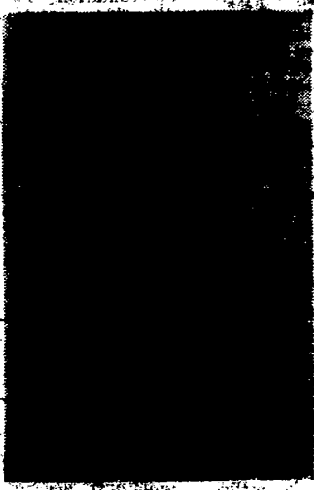

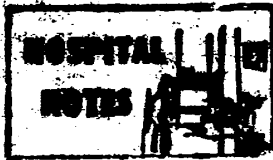
Motion was made by Mrs. Rose Mary Burger to accept the Tax Collector's Report. Motion seconded by Edward Wilson. Passed by vote.

## Hal W. Metzger

Hal W. Metzger, 77, of 9 W. University St., Alfred, died Sunday, May 2, 1976 in St. James Mercy Hospital, Hornell, following a long illness.

A native of Lorain, Ohio, he was instrumental in establishing the astronomy department at Alfred University. An amateur astronomer, he was honored in 1975 by the astronomy and physics faculty at the university which sponsors annually the H. W. Metzger Award for accomplishment in the study of observational or theoretical astronomy.

He was considered a gifted painter and had won awards in the past at the Cleveland Museum of Art and the Albright-Knox Art Gallery in Buffalo.

He and his wife, Margaret, formerly operated the Glidden Gallery gift shop in Alfred.

Mr. Metzger was an assistant station manager and program director at the Cleveland, Ohio, radio station prior to moving to Alfred in 1949. He was a veteran of World War I.

Survivors are his wife, Margaret Funnell Metzger; one son, Chad D. of Lakes Oswego, Wash.; a sister, Mrs. D. B. Wilkin of Andover and three grandchildren.

Private graveside services will be held at the convenience of the family in Alfred Rural Cemetery.
