

Village Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular hearing and regular meeting of the Board of Trustees held in the Village Office building, April 22, 1976 at 7:30 p. m. Present: J. Michael Breen, Mayor; Harold Rice, Karl Graves, Avery Mead and Elmo Barden, Trustees and David Rossman, acting working supt.

An action of persons appealing for or against the budget for the following year was carried by Karl Graves and seconded unanimously.

A RESOLUTION ADOPTING A BUDGET FOR THE FISCAL YEAR COMMENCING JUNE 1, 1976 AND ENDING MAY 31, 1977. APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE OBJECTS OF VIL- LAGE GOVERNMENT AND ES- TABLISHING THE RATES OF CONTRIBUTION FOR OFFI- CERS AND EMPLOYEES FOR SAID YEAR.

This Board of Trustees met at the time and place specified in the notice of the public hearing on the tentative budget and after hearing all persons present to be heard.

IT IS HEREBY BE IT RE- SOLVED that the tentative budget as published, and as herein- after set forth and a copy attached to these minutes, is hereby adopted and that the several amounts stated in the budget be and they are hereby appropriated for the objects and purposes specified and the salaries and wages stated in said budget shall be and hereby approved of the amounts shown there- in effective June 1, 1976.

The resolution adopted by the following vote: Harold Rice - Aye; Karl Graves - Aye; Avery Mead, Aye; and Elmo Barden - Aye. Carried.

The regular monthly meeting was opened by Mayor Breen.

Minutes of the regular meeting held March 10th were read and approved on a motion made by Avery Mead and seconded by Harold Rice.

Minutes of the special meeting held March 10th were read and approved on a motion made by Karl Graves and seconded by Avery Mead.

Minutes of the organization meeting held April 3, were read and approved on a motion made by Avery Mead and seconded by Harold Rice.

Mike Smith was present to find out if the Village was going to install a water line to his property located 417. Moved by Elmo Barden and seconded by Karl Graves to install said water line in season as the work schedule allows.

Letters were read from Senator Everett, Assemblyman Emery, Majority Leader Anderson and Governor Carver in response to the resolution sent protesting against the Federal Revenue Increase and For Capital Aid.

David Rossman gave a report on the safety meeting held by Allegany County Soil Insurance Program held last month.

Officer Breen gave a report on Bicycle Safety Week and stated that it was a great success. More bikes have been registered and everyone was very cooperative.

Mayor Breen gave a report on the Local Govt. Concerns he attended, and felt that this conference was very informative and helpful to the Village of Andover.

Avery Mead gave a report on the landfill meeting he attended in Wellsville.

Elmo Barden gave a report on the meeting of the association and stated that the meeting was carried out the week of April 19th. This is Phase 1 of the project.

Mayor Breen gave a report on the community meetings that he attended on March 14th and April 15th in the Andover Central School building.

The Village personnel agreement with Village Employees will be updated by Elmo Barden who will negotiate with Village Employees.

Mrs. Mary Mesler Tarr

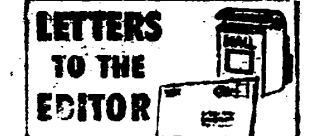

School Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School was called to order at 8:00 on May 10, 1976 by the President, Mary K. Slade. Others present were: William Walker, Francis Horan, Carl Atwell, Conner Stephens, and Curville R. Jordan, District Principal.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read for approval. Francis Horan made the motion and Carl Atwell seconded that these minutes be accepted as read. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

The bills for the General Fund were approved for payment for \$4,758.44 plus utilities. William Walker made the motion and Francis Horan seconded. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

The bills for the Cafeteria were approved for payment for \$1,876.16. Francis Horan made the motion and Carl Atwell seconded the motion. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

The Treasurer's and Clerk's reports were read for comparison. Francis Horan made the motion to accept these reports as read and Carl Atwell seconded the motion. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

The Cafeteria report was read by Mr. Jordan. Francis Horan made the motion to file this report with the minutes. This showed a net profit of \$932.68 for the period. Motion was seconded by William Walker. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

The gross payrolls were read for the approval of the Board. The total was \$31,316.15. Carl Atwell made the motion to approve these and Francis Horan seconded the motion. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Motion was made by Francis Horan and seconded by William Walker that Andover Central School participate in the Bread Bid Program for the 1976-77 school year. Motion carried by 5 votes of yes.

Motion was made by Carl Atwell and seconded by William Walker that Principal of \$2,389.60 and interest of \$388.31 on Bus 31 be paid. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Motion was made by Francis Horan, seconded by Carl Atwell to set the date of Re-organization meeting at July 6th. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

William Walker moved and Francis Horan, seconded that the Board of Education grant the Senior Citizens Group a Bus for a trip to Bolivar, May 23rd. Passed by 5 votes of yes.

Resolution made by Francis Horan, seconded by Carl Atwell, that two snow days be used to extend the Memorial Day weekend - Thursday and Friday - May 27th and 28th. Passed by 5 votes of yes.
