As part of the nation-wide effort to conserve coal, passenger train services on the Erie Railroad will be curtailed according to present plans by eliminating eight through trains and local trains. This is in compliance with orders of the office of Defense Transportation, requiring a 50% reduction in coal burning trains by May 15. Part of the curtailed services goes into effect May 10 when a 25% reduction is to be made. The May 10 reduction will eliminate train 11 and 12 which handles only baggage and express between Jersey City and Chicago and trains 477 and 6 between Hornell and Buffalo in addition to 38 commuter trains in the Jersey City suburban area. As a result of the coal strike, the Erie has been compelled to lay off 550 men.
