John Driscoll represented Greenwood and went with Lawyer Edward Degnan of Canisteo to Albany two weeks ago shearing on the Iroquois Telephone Corp Monday...

The Corporation wants to increase the rates and our lawyer charges it is for non-operating expenses of the parent utility Continental Telephone System.

The petition drive in three communities collected 922 signatures requesting extension of toll free service. They were sent to the P.S.C....

There have been New York Telephone toll increases of 20 percent also since 1974. In 1975 Iroquois Telephone Corp. requested a rate increase and a standing room only crowd turned out in Hornell to list their complaints about the quality of service.

Subscribers in the three Towns charge the proposed rate increase discrimination against them because they live in small communities.

Degnan told them the only way to get to the bottom of this is for them to demand a full investigation and complete audit of the Continental Books. He said the P.S.C. has set up false standards and road blocks to prevent the extension of toll free service for subscribers in the Greenwood and Jasper exchanges.

Greenwood Central School Board of Education Monday adopted a policy covering meeting topics, agenda and procedures to be followed concerning complaints involving staff, facilities, administration and the Board. Persons wishing to present a matter to the Board are to make an appointment five days prior to the meeting. Provision is made for emergency matters and the five day requirement can be waived by a majority vote of the Board. Complaints are to be made to the staff member involved and if no satisfaction is received, then the complaint should be made to the Supervising Principal Gary Moore, and then to the Board. Plans are made for updating of school policy during the summer months with policy prepared in written form.

The Board named Virgil Hussey to serve as Chairman of the June 8 Annual Meeting and approved representatives of the Senior Citizens as Inspectors of Election from Noon to 8 p.m.

Three persons have filed petitions for the Board position to be elected June 8. Thomas Harkenrider, who was appointed to fill the vacancy when John Driscoll resigned, is seeking election to the five year term. Also filed for the five year term are Mrs. June Sekoll and Mrs. Brenda Yarnell.

The Board approved an appropriation of \$1,000 in the 1976-77 Budget for emergency psychological services and dropped the position of psychologist from the Board of Cooperative Educational Services contract. Approval was given for final payment of the plumbing and heating contract so that State Aid can be received. The Board voted not to participate in a maintenance program for the temperature control system, during the 1976-77 year since the one year warranty on the new installation would apply. Moore was directed to secure quotes for replacement of fence for the tennis courts and authorized to accept the lower bid. Approval was given for the group bidding for bread products.

The end of the year schedule was approved. Local and no-Regent Examinations will be given June 17 - 18 and Regents Exams June 18 - 24. June 22 will be the last day for students K - 6 and June 18 will be the last day for Junior High and no-Regents High School students examinations.

It was decided to return the Baccalaureate Services to the Churches. The United Methodist Church will host the 1976 Baccalaureate Service.

Hink's High Jump of 5' 9 1/4" was a Meet record, the old record 5' 9". Greenwood set school records in the Intermediate Hurdles, High Jump and Two Mile Relay. In the girls competition, Troupsburg beat Greenwood 60 - 47.

The boys made it three in a row for Coach Tom Kumar, who is in his final season at the school. Larry Meehan set a school record in the Discus for the third straight Meet with a toss of 11' 5". Losey's time of 25 flat in the 220 Yard Dash was the best in Kumar's four years. Freshman Kevin Moore finished second in the Mile Run in 5:05, his best performance for Kumar.
