The regular monthly meeting of the WSCS of the Methodist Church will be held at the home of Mrs. Robert Common on Thursday, May 23 at 2 P. M.

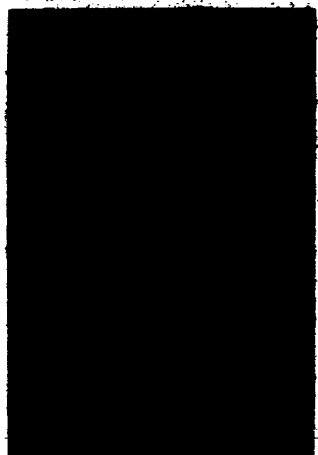

Robert G. Smith Appointed Vice President

Robert G. Smith, a 1948 graduate of Andover, New York Central School, is the newly appointed vice president for development at the University of Maryland.

The appointment was announced during the May meeting of the University of Maryland Board of Regents. Smith, the first vice president for development in the history of the university, is expected to begin his duties by July 1.

Smith, son of Mrs. Donald Smith of Rochambeau Ave., Andover, was vice president for development at the Ohio State University for six years before becoming president of Hansen/Smith Associates, a public relations development firm in Columbus, Ohio.

Smith also served as an executive assistant to the president of Colgate University and secretary of its Board of Trustees from 1966 to 1969. He was the director of public information at Colgate from 1963 to 1966.

As vice president for development at the University of Maryland, Smith will report to the president of the five campus system and will be responsible for university-wide programs in fund raising, alumni affairs, and public relations. The University of Maryland, with its main campus in College Park, has a total enrollment of more than 77,500.

Rev. Jeffrey A. Mackey At 79th Annual General Council of the C M & A

The Rev. Jeffrey A. Mackey of the Christian and Missionary Alliance Church has arrived in Norfolk, Virginia to join over 2,000 other church leaders and representatives from across the United States and Canada at the 79th Annual General Council of the Christian and Missionary Alliance. Some 100 missionaries are also expected as well as several overseas national church leaders representing the Alliance constituency overseas in 44 countries. In 1976 the Alliance has 920 missionaries in these countries.

Dr. Nathan Bailey, President of the Alliance and recently elected president of the National Association of Evangelicals, convened this international conference on May 11 in Norfolk's new Scope Convention Center. The General Council sessions concluded on May 16 with a great Missionary Rally in the 11,000-seat Scope Dome.

A 1977 income goal of \$10,700,000 for the Alliance general fund was presented to the Council and designated largely for overseas missions. During 1975, the 1470 Alliance churches in North America gave more than \$9,500,000 for the general fund and special projects. The annual per capita giving of over \$100 in this evangelical denomination is one of the highest among Protestant church bodies.

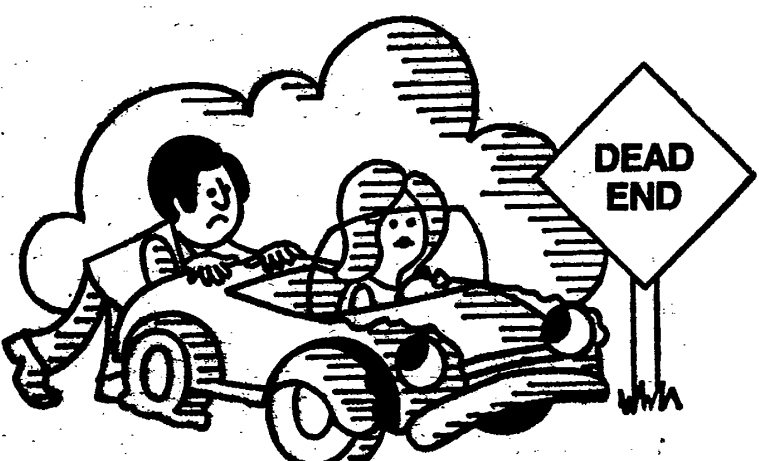
