It should be the duty of all property owners to report to the Village Clerk of any additional users of water from connections already made and all new attachments or services installed. A violation of the rule shall subject the property owner to a fine of \$25.00. Lawn and street sprinkling from kitchen faucets will not be allowed without payment or rental for such purpose. The following are annual rates applicable to dwellings: kitchen faucet \$5.00, 1st additional faucet \$2; 2nd additional faucet 50c; 1st bath tub \$2.00, 2nd bath tub \$1.00; 1st closet \$2.00, 2nd closet \$1.00; 1st lavatory \$1.00, 2nd lavatory 50c; Lawn or hose connection where any of the above connections are used by two families in the same house, an additional charge of 50% will be made except that two families using the same kitchen faucet, will be charged full price for two faucets. The maximum charge for all ordinary household purposes exclusive of lawns in one family not exceeding six members shall be \$10.00 per year regardless of number of connection. 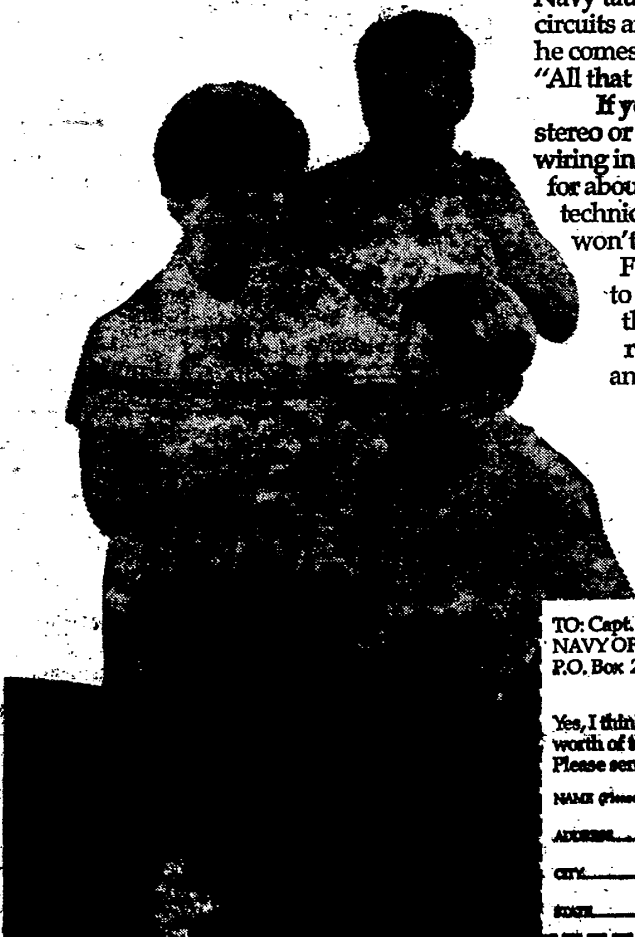
