tion would be extended to upstate communities which might also want to offer tax exemptions for industrial business expansion and increase employment; incentive for a bill to be offered later in the session.

The amendment did not ask for special treatment of upstate New York. Update Democrats simply wanted our upstate communities to have the choice to participate in the maximum tax exemption to improve their economic and employment situations. There is no question about it, the bill is in geographic favor of upstate New York City boss control over upstate Democrats which has ever occurred in the State Legislature.

The amendments were rejected and it was the upstate Democrat Assemblymen who gave their New York City bosses the votes needed to put upstate communities at a business disadvantage.

Debate over the discrimination shown towards upstate New York revealed the Assembly Democrats including those from Rochester and other upstate areas, favored legislation giving New York City more latitude in attempting to keep and attract business and industry than they were willing to grant the rest of the state. The reason, as stated by a Rochester Democrat Assemblyman, was their opinion that upstate government officials couldn't handle the extra responsibility granted to the New York City officials.

If you ask me, the officials in our communities have proven they are more qualified than any New York City officials in the use and management of money. It is the officials of New York City who have led that city to the brink of bankruptcy and it was the upstate taxpayers who bailed New York City out of their fiscal mess.

So when anyone tries to make me believe that we upstate New Yorkers are some kind of second class citizens, I tell them they are wrong. We are the equals to anyone and we should be granted equal rights.
