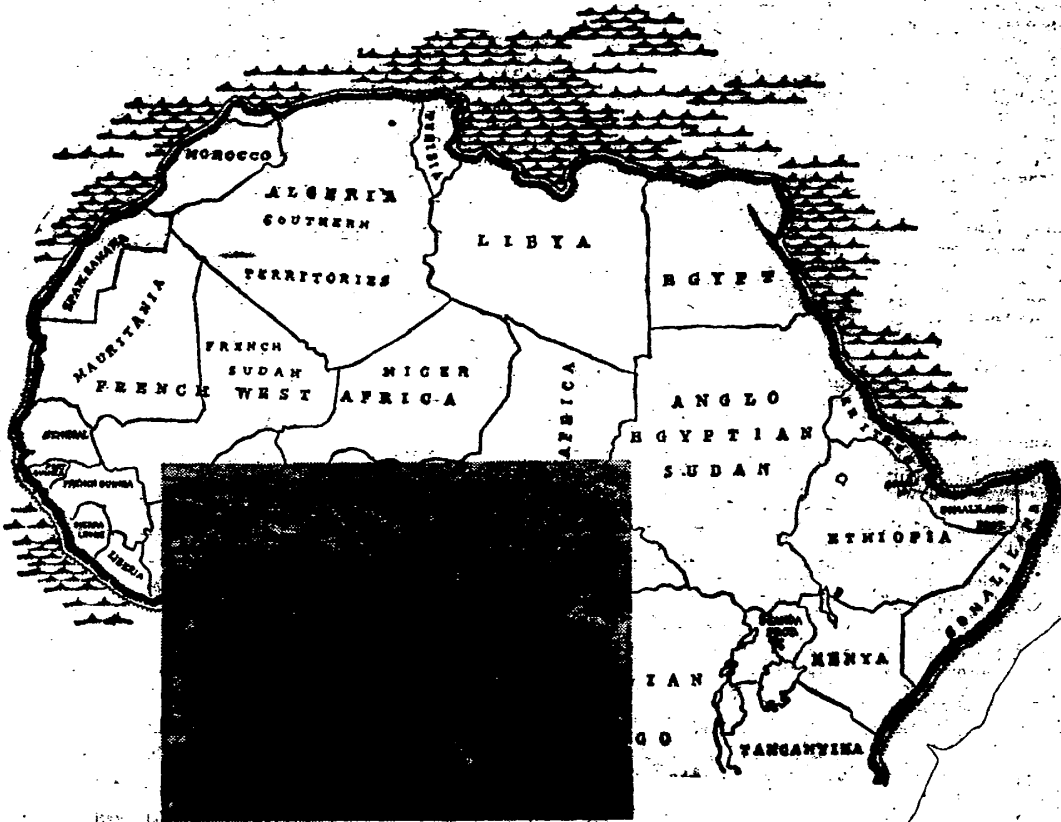
May 29, 1946
