

Village Board Holds Monthly Meetings

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees was held in the Village Office, Monday, May 10, 1976 at 7:30. Those present: J. Michael Braca, Mayor; Karl Graves, Avery Mead, Harold Rice and Elmo Barden, Trustees, and Richard Moran, Electrical Engineer.

Minutes of the Meeting held April 12th were read and approved on a motion made by Avery Mead and seconded by Karl Graves.

Harold Rice reported that Phase I of the electric sub-station has been completed which included sort and confirm that all materials needed have been received erect the super-structure and install the high voltage switch, fuse holders, insulators and lightning arrestors for the sum of \$3,574.00.

Moved by Harold Rice and seconded by Avery Mead to accept the quote of Von Braun Corporation of \$3,500, to complete Phase 2 of the electric sub-station which includes all labor & construction to complete the installation of the high voltage switching, fuses and apparatus, installation of low voltage switches, fuses and apparatus, installation of high voltage conducting and low voltage conducting.

Elmo Barden gave a report on the progress of negotiations with the Village Crew and made recommendations which are being considered.

Moved by Harold Rice and seconded by Avery Mead to accept the resignations from Carol Rowley, Donald Kent and Elmo Barden, with appreciation rendered, from the planning board, and to appoint Joan Baker and Joyce Harris to a 4-year term, Mel Mickle and Merle Fox to a 3-year term and Joan Dain and Donald Thorp Jr. to 2-year terms.

Avery Mead was appointed as liaison to the recreation committee.

Moved by Avery Mead and seconded by Harold Rice to accept the Treasurer's Report and List of Officers for the Andover Fire Department and place these reports on file.

Moved by Avery Mead and seconded by Elmo Barden to make the following amendments to the sidewalk replacement policy: Prior to construction of sidewalk,

A 3 legitimate bids from contractors

B upon Board approval 50% of lowest bid will be reimbursed to the property owner.

This policy is to take effect immediately.

Moved by Elmo Barden and seconded by Karl Graves to issue a building permit to Don Swartz for a patio.

Moved by Avery Mead and seconded by Harold Rice to issue a building permit to Irvin Swartz for a patio.

Dave Rossman gave a report on the activities of the public works department and projects to be started in the near future.

Moved by Avery Mead and seconded by Harold Rice for Officer Dan Howe to attend a seminar on arson to be held in Rochester, May 23th.

Help Needed On Bicentennial Information

The Bicentennial Committee has succeeded in locating some very definite information on the "Forbidden Trail" of the Iroquois which passed near the Village of Andover. A map shows that the trail ran along the ridge east of Harksville, crossed Dyke Creek east of Andover and ran south near Independence Corners. From there it ran along the ridges to Beech Hill and down into Spongo. Over all the trail ran all the way from Tiogo, Pa., to the Seneca Villages along the Allegheny River.

To the Senecas it served as a military path for the rapid movement of warriors and the term "forbidden" came from the fact that white men were forbidden to use it for security reasons. So strong was this code enforced that there is no written record of a white man using the trail until David Zeisberger, the Moravian missionary, passed along the trail in 1767. The trail has a definite Bicentennial flavor because almost certainly numerous Seneca warriors moved along the trail in 1779 as they gathered to face General Sullivan's Army at the battle of Newtown near present day Elmira.

Older residents of our area are asked to recall any bits of information from the past which may help to more closely locate definite points on the trail. It appears that the trail may have come down Shovel Hollow from the Call Hill area, crossed Dyke Creek and then ran southward toward Independence in the general area of Davis Hill and Bess Hollow. It is possible however, that the trail may have crossed Dyke Creek at a point farther east towards Greenwood Hill. If you have any information from the past pertaining to possible points of location please contact Mrs. Bernard Burger or Alan Tuttle or any member of the Committee. Your help will be appreciated.

The meeting was called to order by acting President, William Walker. Carl Atwell made the motion that the minutes of the regular and special meeting be accepted as read. Conner Stephens seconded. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

The Clerk's and Treasurer's reports were read for comparison. Carl Atwell made the motion that these reports be accepted as read and William Walker seconded the motion. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

Carl Atwell made the motion that the General Fund Warrant for \$48,221.03 be accepted for payment. Conner Stephens seconded the motion. Passed by 3 votes of yes.
