Motion to nominate Ethel Kelley as Treasurer was made by Mary K. Slade, Carl Atwell seconded. Carried by 3 yes votes.

Conner Stephens moved, Carl Atwell seconded that the Official Depository be the Andover Branch of the Citizens National Bank Passed by 3 votes of yes.

A motion was made by Carl Atwell, seconded by Conner Stephens, that Curvile Jordan be Purchasing Agent for Andover Central School. Carried by 3 yes votes.

Conner Stephens moved, Carl Atwell seconded that Mary K. Slade be appointed Vice-President of the Board of Education. Carried by 3 yes votes.

Conner Stephens moved and Mary K. Slade seconded that Carl Atwell be appointed Clerk of the Board of Education. Passed by 3 yes votes.

Carl Atwell moved and Mary K. Slade seconded that the Andover Medical Center Doctors be approved as the school doctors for 1976-77 school year. Carried by 3 yes votes.

Carl Atwell moved, Conner Stephens seconded that the Andover News be appointed official newspaper. Carried by 3 yes votes.

Conner Stephens moved, Carl Atwell seconded that Doris Mulconery be appointed Petty Cashier. Carried by 3 yes votes.

Carl Atwell moved, Conner Stephens seconded that William Argyer be appointed school attorney for the 1976-77 school year. Carried by 3 yes votes.

Carl Atwell moved, Conner Stephens seconded that the meeting be adjourned. Carried by 3 yes votes.

Mr. G. William Delamar, postmaster at Binghamton, has announced today that the Binghamton Post Office, in conjunction with the arrival of the Freedom Train, will provide a special Freedom Train hand cancellation.

To get this cancellation, do one of the following:

1. Send a self-addressed stamp envelope to Postmaster Binghamton, N. Y. 13902, noting on the outside envelope, "Freedom Train Cancellation." Envelopes need a minimum of 13c and post cards need 9c to be accepted for cancellation.

2. Deposit the envelope or card to be cancelled in a specially designated, deposit box at the train location. This is the only location where mail may be deposited to obtain the Freedom Train Cancellation.

Persons Receiving SSI Checks May Apply For Food Stamps

Starting this July, persons receiving Supplementary Security Income (SSI) checks may apply for Food Stamps. Those people who live alone or with another SSI recipient will receive a short form in the mail. They need only fill out that form and SEND it to the Department of Social Services in Angelica. Those who live with others must go to the Department of Social Services in Angelica to apply. Through cooperation between the Allegheny County Department of Social Services, the Office of the Aging and Cattaraugus County Community Action Program, help with some of this paper work will be available in various parts of the county.

If anyone is interested in joining the swim team next year, John Davis will run a training program throughout the summer. He will work on strokes and racing techniques. The time is Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 11 A. M. - 11:45 A. M. Advanced Lifesaving will also be taught at this time to anyone 15 years or older who is in good physical shape and have passed swimmers.

Free Swim will be held daily unless otherwise indicated on schedule K - 4 Grade Free Swim will be from 1 - 2 P. M.; 5 - 12 Grade Swim will be from 2:30 - 3:30. The bathing cap rule will be STRICTLY enforced. No one with hair below their neckline will be allowed to swim without a bathing cap.

Andover won its 3rd Game of the year at the expense of Scio by a 7 - 6 score.

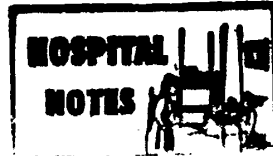
