"Inside The State Capital"

The New York State Supplemental Budget has, in the past, often proven to be a valuable source of funds for numerous upstate projects and programs which would have been left floundering if it were not for this additional income. The usual allotment of funds for these projects is in the neighborhood of \$20 million, and I would even have accepted as much as \$35 million for these purposes.

The situation this year, however, was remarkably different in that the Supplemental Budget totalled \$87 million, cash funds with \$105 million in appropriations, a figure far in excess of what we should be spending at a time when the state is experiencing severe economic and financial problems.

It is obvious that the state has garnered a substantial surplus in revenue this year, but I think it fiscally unwise to turn around and spend this surplus all at once in the Supplemental Budget. What is needed more at this time is meaningful tax relief such as the package I co-sponsored this year to provide tax cuts to both state residents and the business community. I could not bring myself to support a Supplemental Budget that appropriated all excess state revenues to "pet projects" for certain legislators who obeyed the commands of their bosses, while a more worthy use could be made of the funds through tax cut measures.

This year's Supplemental Budget was a prime example of "pork-barreling" and it was replete with items rewarding loyal legislators for their votes on certain issues. The state revenues are being used to the detriment of the people in general for partisan political benefits, and this type of power politics is not my idea of equal representation.

The squandering of the taxpayers money in this year's Supplemental Budget has taken the shape of various programs and projects, many of which are not vital to the people of this state. A good example is the \$2 million appropriated to construct a new railroad repair shop in Binghamton while a similar facility lies dormant in a community approximately 65 miles away.

Spending all of the state's surplus revenues at one time, much of which is being used to play the political game of favoritism, instead of channeling the funds into meaningful tax relief measures is the primary reason I voted against this year's Supplemental Budget.

As the result of legislation passed this session, SSI recipients in New York State — the blind, aged and disabled, — will be receiving a raise in their Social Security benefits without experiencing any decrease in their SSI benefits.

SSI recipients are some of the neediest citizens in our state and the rate of inflation we are experiencing is having a devastating effect on their incomes. To grant a cost of living increase to their Social Security benefits, and then to take it away through a decrease in their state SSI benefits as the law now allows is totally unjust.

The Legislature has acted very responsibly by granting this "pass-through" measure which allows a Social Security increase without a subsequent SSI decrease. This measure is also beneficial in that it calls for the state to absorb the 1976 share of the SSI increase which would otherwise have to be paid by local governments until Oct. 1 when both the state and federal governments will share the cost of the increase.
