To resolve the problem. Commissioner Goodwin wanted to go to court to force the tenants to pay the rent increase which was necessary to keep the public housing project financially sound.

Governor Carey went around Commissioner Goodwin in resolving the problem and he says he will find some other new revenues so the rent increases won't have to be implemented. That means the Governor will be seeking more tax dollars to subsidize Co-op City.

Commissioner Goodwin said she could not live with the Carey action and decision. She therefore resigned saying someone who fully believes in the Carey policy should hold her office.
