They sold out what they could in the two weeks time and the remaining stock and equipment will be sold at a Public Auction Thursday evening, July 22, beginning at 5 P. M.

The Nyes bought the store from Mr. and Mrs. Clair Kernan in 1971. Louise worked with Eleanor Kernan for two weeks then was on her own. Soon Mrs. Bernice Mann came in to help run the store with her niece. She has had 18 years dealing with the public, 5 years at the D. L. Fisher Grocery in Canisteo, then for the Canisteo Appliance, Wilkinson's Variety Store and Carpetville in Canisteo. She will return and will continue to be School Tax Collector for the Greenwood School District.

The Nyes have four children, Flo (Mrs. James Feenaghty), Darla and Ricky and two years ago Lucinda joined the family. The baby's birth brought on a congenital heart condition for Mrs. Nye. She underwent open heart surgery and hospitalization in intensive care later to stabilize a rapid heart beat with the right medication. She was ill again and began to give more serious consideration for her health. The baby also will need heart surgery when she is older.

The store is for sale but there haven't been buyers. A young couple was interested but couldn't get financial backing to buy.

The Nyes have been very accommodating and enlarged the variety for sale also installing more electrical equipment and freezer space. We will surely miss them and their store. She also had one of the telephones for the Volunteer Firemen.

Mrs. Nye wishes to express her appreciation to all the customers who have traded with them for their support.

There are increasing regulations about the operation of the store and talk from the suppliers that they may not continue to stop at the small stores because of the growing decline in the number of stores. SURPLUS PREDICTIONS PROVEN CORRECT

News this week from Albany has proven correct our Republican prediction of a sizeable surplus in state revenues. In fact, we predicted the surplus would run as high as \$300-million and it looks like we will most certainly exceed that estimate.

Governor Carey said our motives for the prediction were political. He said that we made the prediction only to make his severe budget cutting — which included major cuts in education, transportation, drug rehabilitation, the State University and Community Colleges, and nearly every other state agency — look extremist and irresponsible.

The Governor said our push for a legislative package to reduce

taxes on you the state taxpayers by whatever amount the surplus came to, was purely glambur without foundation.

We knew our revenue estimates were accurate and so we went to two leading economists at Cornell University and asked their opinion. The economists arrived at revenue estimates nearly identical to ours, as did nearly every other non-political economic expert.

Now, each month we are witnessing a growth in state revenues of nine to 13 per cent above last year's levels. Now, when it is almost too late because the legislature has adjourned and gone home without acting on the Republican measure of reduce taxes, the Governor is finally admitting to the fact that revenues are way ahead of his estimates.

In traveling around the 136th Assembly District, the people have made it clear to me that they want tax cuts. And I have made it clear to them, that the legislature should act now to give the surplus revenues back to the people before Governor Carey and the huge state bureaucracy spend it all.

I have told the residents of my district that Governor Carey and his Democratic colleagues who hold the majority in the State Assembly should act immediately to suspend the cable-tv sales tax that was imposed by the Democrat Tax Commissioner. They should go even further and reduce the sales tax on home heating fuels and cutback the income tax and the income tax surcharge.

I am greatly disturbed with these Democrats who say they are for the little people, the working men and women of this state, and then they won't even repeal a cable-tv sales tax or an income tax surcharge when the state is sitting on top of a \$300-million tax revenue surplus.

Commissioner Lee Goodwin recognized nationwide as an outstanding administrator who really knows public housing, resigned recently over a dispute with Governor Carey on the resolution of the problem created by the rent strikers at Co-op City in New York City.

Most people of upstate New York have been unaware of the six-month strike by tenants of the Co-op City public housing development in New York City. For six months the renters refused to pay their rent in a dispute over a rent increase ordered by Commissioner Lee Goodwin.

To resolve the problem, Commissioner Goodwin wanted to go to court to force the tenants to pay the rent increase which was necessary to keep the public housing project financially sound.

Governor Carey went around Commissioner Goodwin in resolving the problem and he says he will find some other new revenues so the rent increases won't have to be implemented. That means the Governor will be seeking more tax dollars to subsidize Co-op City.

Commissioner Goodwin said she could not live with the Carey action and decision. She therefore resigned saying someone who fully believes in the Carey policy should hold her office.

If the Governor's policy is full support for free rent in New York City and a lack of control over rent strikers, it is most unfortunate for all of us upstate taxpayers who will have to foot the bill for this latest boondoggle.

When we consider that people who earn \$20,000 per year can live in New York City public housing supported by upstate residents who earn half as much if they're lucky, then it is clear this latest move by Governor Carey is a totally disgraceful rip-off of the upstate taxpayers.
