

**Grocery Gems & Goodies**

Hi Folks! Have you noticed that our supply of canning supplies seem to be adequate this year? Since the Home Canning system seems to be growing by leaps and bounds, here is a word of warning being issued by the U.S.D.A. as well as many Extension Agencies.

The threat of Botulism now looms in the most popular home canned item — Tomatoes! The very word "Botulism" — strikes terror — and very well it might, for this treacherous form of food poisoning, usually caused by improper home canning, can paralyze in hours — and kill agonizingly in days.

Formerly, it was thought that Botulism only occurred in low acid items such as fish, beans, etc., but because of new strains of low acid tomatoes, an increasing number of cases have been reported recently that have been traced to home canning.

The U.S.D.A. recommends, the addition of 1/2 teaspoon of Citric Acid per quart; or 2 teaspoons of lemon juice per quart; or 2 teaspoons of 5% vinegar per quart. Any of these additions will only alter the taste very slightly and still take care of the problem.

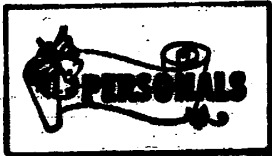
In the Produce Department, Cukes are 10c ea.; Bananas are 5 lbs. for \$1.00; and Nectarines are 39c per pound.
