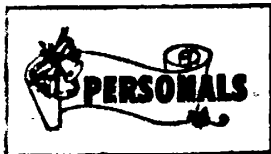

Grocery Gems & Goodies

Hi Folks! Enjoying the Summer? Want to know how things look for the month of August? Well, here is what the USDA says about that situation.

BEEF — plentiful. Production is average 4-6% above last year, and 12% above the past 2 year average. **PORK** — light. Production to be seasonally reduced, but up 10% from last year's unusually low level. **POULTRY & EGGS** — plentiful. Record marketings to be about 14% more than last year.

MILK & DAIRY PRODUCTS — adequate. Milk production should be well above last year; Butter is

7% lower and stocks are somewhat tight; however, American Cheese production is over 14% above past 3-year average.

Now, for the "Best Buys" this week. In the Meat Department, Frying Chickens are 45c a lb.; Sugar-dale "Coneys" are 69c for a 12-oz. pkg.; Fresh Ground Chuck is 89c; Boneless Beef Chuck Roast is 99c; Boneless Round Steak is \$1.39 per pound; Boneless Chuck Steaks are \$1.19 a lb.; and Cubed Round Steak is \$1.59 a lb.

In the Grocery Department, R & W Green Beans or Sliced Beets are 5 cans for \$1; Strawberry Preserves are 99c for a 1-lb. 2-oz. jar; Prince's Elbow Macaroni is 69c for a 3-lb. box; Our Value Pork & Beans is 69c for a 2-lb. 8-oz. can; R & W Potato Chips are 49c for a 9-oz. pkg.; and 7 Farms Apple Sauce is 89c for 3 cans.

In the Produce Department, Michigan Potatoes are 99c for a 10-lb. bag; Valencia Oranges are 99c for a 4-lb. bag; Ohio Sweet Corn is 99c a doz.; Honey Dew Melons are 99c ea.; and Peaches are 3 lbs. for \$1.
