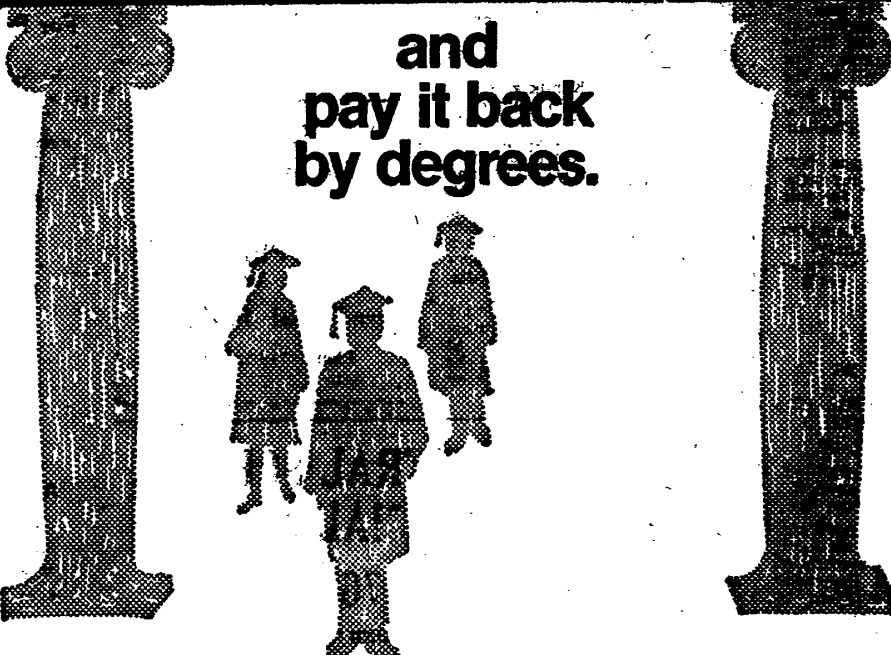

**Grocery Gems & Goodies**

Hi Folks! The last two weeks we covered most of the agricultural predictions for August so will finish this week. Summer cucumbers are plentiful with the crop 26% higher than the '73-'75 average; watermelon harvest is wide spread, supplies will continue to be plentiful.

Peas are plentiful with the '75 crop 5% larger than previous record. Almonds are plentiful reaching 47% above last year. Pecans and walnuts are plentiful from large crops last year.

Rice is plentiful because of record 1975 production and reduced exports; Wheat is plentiful with large carryover on May, 1976 about 9% above '73-'75 average. Corn is plentiful with '76 production 14% above previous high of 1975; Dry Beans are plentiful as a result of reduced export ship
