In the Meat Department, Beef liver is 49c a lb.; Fresh Ground Chuck is 89c a lb.; Round Steak is \$1.09; Boneless Round Steak is \$1.29 a lb.; and Boneless Top Round Steaks are \$1.39; with Boneless Rump Roasts at \$1.49 a lb. And, if you are tired of beef, Pork Butt Roasts are 99c a pound; Cornish Game Hens are 89c a lb.; and Superior Brand Polish Sausage is 89c a lb.

John W. Cannon is driving a new Master Six Chevrolet Sedan.

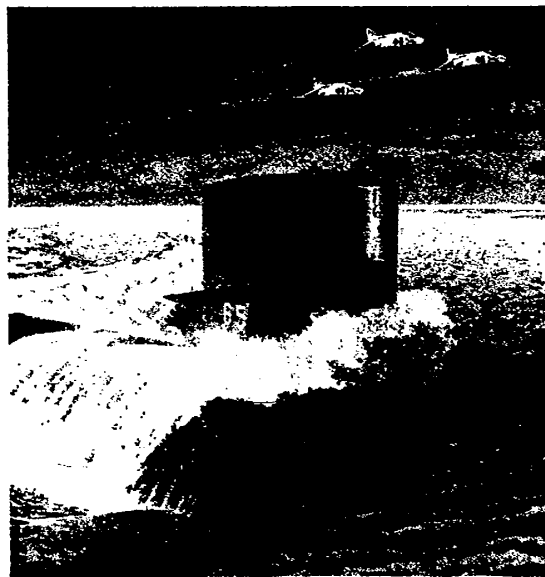
