Now that the dust has settled from the final session of the State Legislature for 1796...

Once again this year, as in the past, I have had the privilege of guiding several bills of special importance to local communities through the legislature...

GENESEO LAND PURCHASE - The Village of Geneseo had an immediate need for land to construct a fire hall and an ambulance garage...

Legislation was needed to authorize the State Commissioner of Transportation to sell and convey to the Village of Geneseo a parcel of land in the village...

ALLEGANNY CHURCH LAND PURCHASE - The Belleville Wesleyan Church for the Town of New Hudson in Allegany County needs further land space for water, septic and parking facilities...

WADSWORTH LIBRARY TRUSTEES - The Board of Trustees for the Wadsworth Library of Geneseo requested an increase in the size of its membership from five to seven...

HEMLOCK FIRE DISTRICT - The Hemlock Fire District was seeking to sell bonds for necessary purchases and it found that there is no official records on file in the County of Livingston or the State of New York...

GENESEO SCHOOL AID - Several years ago, the Geneseo Central School District agreed to take half of the students from the SUNY Learning Center (Holtcomb School) and over 300 students were brought into the Geneseo public school district...

JONES MEMORIAL HOSPITAL - Jones Memorial Hospital in the Village of Wellsville needs to be able to contract with private physicians so as to bring more doctors into the area...

As you can see, there is nothing overly glamorous in the local legislation passed, but seeing to it that this legislation is properly introduced and passed through the State Legislature is a major responsibility of a State Assemblyman...

Mrs. Pearl Robida of Niagara Falls, returned home this week after being a guest of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Kinner for three weeks.

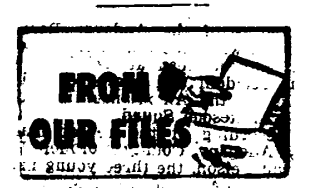
