Saturday night the Hulse Brothers gave the Volunteer Firemen the use of their New Barn for a Barn Warming Celebration, Round and Square Dance. It was well attended by mostly middle age and seniors who were familiar with that type of dancing. Some of the young folks thought it was pretty queer.

The new metal heifer barn is across the farm drive from the similar metal buildings which house the milking parlor. The free stall housing barn for the 155 to 180 cow Holstein dairy, the farm, including sheds and other out-buildings. One story structures have replaced the red barns with hay mows on the second floor. There are several large concrete silos towering above the long metal buildings for the food storage system for farm animals.

The three brothers, Howard, Leo and Burdette Hulse own and rent 1400 acres of land in the West Greenwood area. They raise 280 acres of corn, 70 acres of oats. Hay is harvested and stored in the silos, but they also make 18,000 bales of second cutting hay. There are six tractors on the farm during harvest season, and are used.

The milking herd ranges from 155 to 180. They raise 165 heifers with many going into the herd for replacement. The brothers grew up on the farm where the main buildings are located and the Burdette Hulse family live. The brothers began farming on their own in 1961. It is a typical family operation. Burdette and son, Michael, 14, can do many of the farm jobs. His wife, Patsy, and Howard's wife, Patricia, often do the milking when the men work late in the fields. Because the three brothers work together they can each have every third Sunday off and some brief vacations.

The Greenwood Hulses were the first on the scene when their dairy barn, burned Nov. 15, 1970. Four fire companies worked on the scene that night to save the first stall addition and the brothers could continue their dairy operation that winter. The Hulse brothers made the new barn available to the Firemen because they wanted to help the Firemen who helped them. For the Firemen it was a chance to add to the funds needed to pay for their new pumps.
