Wednesday, September 8, Greenwood Central School opens for a full day beginning at 8:24 a. m., to 2:36 p. m. Principal Gary Moore says they hope to place more emphasis on improving curriculum and contact with students and parents. The 8th period after school will help to improve some of the contacts. There will be a daily late bus for students and to help parents cut down on travel. The buses will run basically the same routes, with some change. The first late bus returns from BOCES about 3:10 and will hold until 3:30. A second late bus at about 4:45 - 5:00 for those who stay for Band or Chorus. This will occasionally be cancelled if the teams are playing soccer.

A special thanks to bus drivers Spina Cook, Howard Bennett, Mike Sky and Erv Allen, who all volunteered their time to drive the Band to parades. The savings to the District in salaries alone would be close to \$1,000. The Band made excellent showing winning \$1,100 with several first prizes thanks to Mr. Kickbush and the Bands Boosters Club.

The Sports Boosters Club has raised about \$500 towards the purchase of the new glass backboards for the Gym. They plan a spaghetti supper Friday night, Sept 17 from 5 to 8 p. m., to continue raising money to pay the entire \$1,100 for the new glass backboards, mounting frame pipes, etc. They still have about a dozen flags for sale at \$10.00 each which will also be used for the back boards. School pictures are scheduled for September 20.

New fence is being installed around the tennis courts. There was almost constant use of the courts this summer. Lights will soon be installed for evening play.

There are five new teachers on the faculty. The PTA plans a "Meet Your Teacher Night" for both old and new on Tuesday, September 14 at 7:45 p. m. in the school cafeteria. This is an excellent opportunity to meet all the teachers and attend the first PTA meeting of the year. There will be Driver Education. In the limited amount of time available to driver education classes, we try to touch as many aspects of the total driving job as is possible. We do a total job in 30 class sessions and it is an impossible task, so some things must be eliminated, things which some people consider important. Keeping in mind that the goal of Driver Education is the Education of the Drivers instead of the training of drivers. Our over-all concept of Driver Education is geared towards Educating for the total job rather than training for a specific particular instructional phase will purpose. For this reason it has always been recommended that all students have a permit so that the opportunity to drive exists beyond Driver Education Class.

The Title I Remedial Reading Program will continue to be in operation the 1976-77 school year. This is a Federally funded operation designed to help children who are reading below their grade level. There will be 22 children in this program ranging from the first through sixth grades. They work to improve their reading ability in skills and comprehension. They work in small groups with a variety of different reading materials. In the past it has proved successful in raising children's academic work and their enjoyment in reading. Inside The State Capital

With hundreds of thousands of students returning to colleges and universities around the state, many of them face an extremely serious situation brought about by the continued ineptitude of the Carey Administration in providing adequate funds. Many of these students find that they are unable to pay their tuition costs because they have not yet received the assistance due them from the colleges under the State's Tuition Assistance Program.

TAP was approved by the State Legislature in 1974 to provide private college tuition funding to students from middle income families in this state. At the same time, the State Education Services Commission (HESAC) was set up to administer the TAP program.

In the first two years of existence TAP has proved to be an extremely valuable aid not only for students in the middle income bracket who need help with the extremely high college education costs, but also for the private colleges in this state who have themselves had financial difficulty because of cost.

For the coming school year there were 218,000 TAP applications. Most of these should have been processed long before the colleges and universities began the present fall term in order for students to know if they are receiving assistance, and if so, how much assistance.

Unfortunately, a major breakdown in the computer operation of HESAC caused a four month delay in the processing which is just now underway. This could have been avoided easily if it had not been for the stubborn and totally unexplainable attitude of the Carey Administration.

When it was discovered that this breakdown had occurred and that the processing was being held up, offers of help from outside computer services, equipment, and provisional staff were forthcoming as long ago as last April. The offers were ignored or rejected, and throughout the spring and summer no progress took place.

Other Legislators and myself became aware of this situation when our offices began receiving mail from parents of these students deeply concerned that they had not yet received word concerning the TAP assistance. College officials were equally alarmed because if the TAP money was not forthcoming to their institutions, they would have been forced to obtain financing from conventional lending sources at very high interest rates which they cannot afford.

It has been reported that this serious breakdown in the computer system and the HESAC operation was due to the inexperience of those placed on the staff by the Carey Administration and by a lack of guidance from his office. Further proof of the inability of this Administration to handle the TAP Program was the fact that a board of directors for HESAC which was required by legislation enacted in 1974 to establish major policy, was never appointed by the Governor until this past May. If ever there was an example of what inept administration can do to foul up a well intentioned and important program, the handling of this TAP situation was it.

I understand that the computers are working again and that these applications are being processed at long last. I know from experience that officials at Alfred University were extremely concerned about this situation. I only hope that the problem can be rectified before it causes undue hardship on students, parents, and school officials depending upon the TAP resources and, we must see to it that this kind of thing does not recur again.
