News Briefs Of Local Servicemen

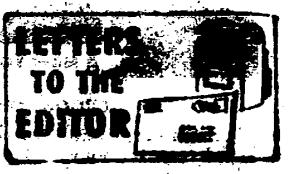
Steven Scott left Thursday, Sep-

Friday, October 1st. Niagara Mo-
hawk had completed attaching the
Primary Line to the new Sub
Station. The Power Authority of
the State of New York has install-
ed the metering system.

Under the guidance of Electrical
Engineer, Dick Moran, Superin-
tendent, Rossman energized the
new transformer. In the next few

ing and instrumentation. At this
