Career Education

Andover is very fortunate to receive a New York State Grant for Career Education. This grant designates Andover as a model school. This indicates that Andover is considered a leader in the implementation of Career Education.

The grant stipulates that Andover Central School students grades K - 12 will study the school as a working institution. Students will therefore be studying the school's influence and importance as a part of the community. Also, students will learn about the occupations, responsibilities and duties of each of the members of the school employees.

The program tentatively includes the use of resource people coming in to the school to speak with groups of students; a shadowing program in which children will follow, help and learn from school employees, and special projects involving the community and every facet of the school's operation.

A Career Education Conference was held in Albany, September 24, 1976. This conference was to discuss the uses for the Career Education Grant that was given by the State, to eight schools. Those schools are Andover, Cuba, Hamburg, Iroquois Central, Lewiston, Porteo, Mamaroneck, Pearl River and Syracuse.

The two members of our faculty who attended this conference were Mrs. Rosemary Burger and Mrs. Lyn Griffiths. They were greeted by Dr. Viviana Anderson, Assistant Commissioner for General Education and Curricular Services. The meeting was conducted by John Hogle.

Fluoride Treatment

Eligibility System

This is the 1976-1977 Eligibility System for the school year.

1. Students may receive U's for not maintaining a good scholastic grade average. This may constitute ineligibility for participation in scholastic sports.
 2. Students receiving U's are eligible to participate in practices.
 3. Roster of all athletes will be provided to individual teachers.
 4. Every Friday teachers and students will consult during class time on eligibility status. If a U is to be given the teacher will notify the student and the office immediately.
 5. Students will have the opportunity to remove all U's unless they occur consecutively three times in the same course. At that point, no removal of a U will be possible. It will be up to the teacher to let the student know what he must do to remove the U. Teachers should notify the office by Monday if the U has been removed.
 6. All coaches will check in the office Mondays before practices to determine the eligibility of any student.
- Students - make yourselves aware of these rules and prevent yourself from becoming ineligible.
