Presbyterians Plan Reception For Their Pastor

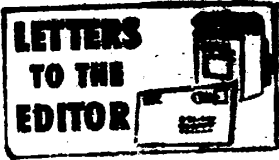

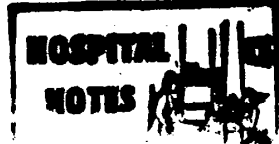
