The Greenwood Town Board will hold the Budget Hearing for the Year 1977 at 8 P. M., Thursday, November 4, at the Town Hall. Town Supervisor, John Helgeron, says increases in several account appropriations are expected to be offset by increases in valuations and he expects little change in the rate. The Highway Budget has been lowered slightly, but the appropriation for fire and liability insurance has been increased from \$3600 to \$5000 because of increased coverage in a raise in rates. The Highway Superintendent salary has been increased from \$9000 to \$9800. The last meeting was spent mostly on completing work on the Preliminary Budget. A progress report was made on the remodeling of a portion of the Town Hall to provide office space for two Doctors who would be in Greenwood some time each week. The work was expected to be done by Saturday, October 30. Mr. Bob Malin has assisted Mr. Ervin Allen in carpentry; Lloyd Chaffee has done plumbing and Bryan Higgins the electrical work. An announcement is expected in the immediate future about office hours for the Hornell Doctors.

The Youth Group of the United Methodist Church went from door-to-door Sunday, October 31 to collect money for UNICEF, an international children's relief organization, sponsored by the United Nations. Leaders Bob Oger and Mrs. Max Hoyt supervised the drive and the youth returned to the church for refreshments and lesson. The total collected was \$85.00 with ten youth working.

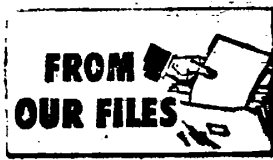
