Inside The State Capital

Now that the election is over we have a chance to reflect on what is ahead for the next two years in New York State and specifically with the New York State Legislature. May I make one personal note and thank all those who supported me in returning me to the Assembly for the seventh time. I also appreciate all of the good wishes I have received from all sections of the State District since the election.

Now those of us who have once again been elected to the public trust must set to work to carry out the promises which were made during the election campaign. The people today are extremely knowledgeable and responsive to the issues which have to be faced, and we as legislators have an obligation to carry out our campaign words with utmost fidelity.

Certainly the 1977 Legislature must address itself to the critical matter of State Reform as well as the bare-bone cost of local government and the continuing high cost of State Government. We must face the fact that when we return to Albany in January the two houses of the Legislature will be split politically with the Republicans in control of the Senate and Democrats in control of the Assembly. And each party will be trying to present its own philosophy.

Be that as it may, the message of most voters in upstate New York in this last election was clear - cut welfare costs and cut taxes. This was true in upstate areas represented by Democrats as well as Republicans. Still, it's up to the voters to keep careful tabs of the voting record of their legislators (and I certainly include myself) to see that they deliver on those promises that were made.

Another topic which will undoubtedly receive much attention in the coming two years will be the continuing battle of aid to education. Talk still persists of a possible change in the state-aid formula which would favor school districts in urban areas and could be potentially detrimental to school districts such as those in this area with a city or city-oriented government now both in Albany as well as Washington, D. C.

I think this is something upon which we must keep a close watch. Any loss of school state-aid would be an extra burden on the real property tax and it was clear in my travels throughout the 136th District that property owners have already been taxed to their limits and beyond. If there is an answer, that the state must assume a larger share of the educational budget.

I am also sure that during the upcoming session attention will be focused on the skyrocketing cost of automobile insurance in this state. Tax forces in both the Assembly and the Senate are already at work holding hearings on this knotty problem.

While it is true that insurance premiums in some cases are being kept reasonable, I think it must be pointed out that the heart of the problem does not necessarily lie with the insurance companies themselves. Costs of auto repairs continue to climb and medical and hospital rates are at their highest levels in history. These are the chief reasons why insurance premiums are so high and whose picture must be carefully studied before any changes are made in our present no-fault insurance laws.
