There has been a move to petition the Town Board to assume the Water Company which serves a small portion of Main St. in the Village. Heirs of the persons who owned the company are being sought. Mr. Heigerson said it looks as if the Town will be asked to form a water district in 1977.

An agricultural district of \$10,000 acres is being formed to include portions of Greenwood, Jasper, Troupsburg and Rexville. Mrs. June Sekor and Mrs. Barbara Hutse are securing necessary signatures. This is basically on Agricultural Townships and quite a few young people are remaining on farms. Greenwood like many other small rural towns in the Southern Tier is faced with increasing property taxes and a tight money situation.

There are a few indications that things will change in 1977. It is the 150th anniversary of the founding of the Town in 1827 and we expect to celebrate our Sesqui-Centennial. Greenwood, Jasper and Troupsburg School Districts will be considering a proposal to consolidate the three districts into one in the coming months. Each Town will keep their own Elementary School and a Consolidated High School would be built in a central location. One of the major factors in their decisions will be economic and tax protection and how to get the most education for their tax dollar. The Town is considering changing to 100% tax valuation of property.

A June 25th wedding is planned for Miss Laurie O'Brien and Scott Kickbush. Their engagement was announced by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard O'Brien of the Canistota Road.
