50 YEARS AGO

September 17, 1926

Church was read, this being the 81st anniversary of the log school house in which the following teachers taught: Sarah Ann Back, Sara Lowell, Jane Burt and Flora Wilson. Mr. Otis Gowdy was present and gave a fine history of the old log school house which had laid down for 50 years. The next school house was completed 76 years ago which was 13 x 19 feet inside and is in use at present for a woodshed, in which the following teachers taught: Flora Wilson, Lucinda Post, Amelia Wittey, Jane Dyer, Lydia Adams, Emily Voorhees, Valeria Adams, James Crandall, Marion Wills, Sara Ann Minzous, Jeanette Ripenbark, Clemie Fulmer, Tibbie Gifford, Mary Wells, Alice Briggs, Minnie Elliott, Marion Austin, Nancy Todd, Frank Jones, Rosa Emmon, Elmina Parker, Emma Davton, Helen Parker, Annabelle Waffle, Sarah Partridge, Mrs. Brown and Bridget J. Shaughnessy.

The present school house was built 51 years ago is as large and fine, equipped as any rural school building which can be found. From 30 to 50 years ago it used to house from 50 to 80 scholars and at present the attendance is about eight.

Since our first session four years ago seven former teachers and 23 former scholars have died. Signed "An Old Timer".
