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# Big Attendance As **Concerned Citizens** Hold Meeting Sat.

About 85 Tarpeyers braved frield weether and blizzare conditions Saturday afternoon to attend a meeting at the Andover Crange Hall to discuss possible courses of action to be pursued regarding the large increase in the Andover Town Tax Rate

A complete range of ideas were presented from a ridiculous suggestion of "secoding from the County and State" to refusing to apply for State and Federal funds. In response to the first idea, it was pointed out that the South had at In response to the first idea. It was posinted out that the South had at tempted to pursue this avenue back in the 1860's with disasrous results in what was known as "The Civil War" or "The War. Between the States" depending on the location of a person's residence and the location of the publishing firm that prints the History Books used in the Schools, And, in response to the latter idea of noi applying for State or Federal Aid, some people felt that as long as the money was going to be passed out to some area — we might as well have our share; while others felt that we should take a long, hard look — and see if it woud cost the Taxpayers more money in the long run for matching local funds along with the administration and control that goes along with so called "Free Federal Funds."

"The recting which had been called for two v m., got off to a rather slow start as Supervisor Howard Burdick. the Invited "Guest of Honor", reported that he was unable to get any of his vehicles started due to the bizzard which resulted in one of the Taxpayer's volunteering to go and him him up to the meeting with his 4-wheel drive vehicle.

Milton Hurne acted as Chairman of the meeting with feelings run-ning "rather high" at times as nnig "rather high" at time-several delicate points were aired

One past grievances had been aired — and the "air somewhat cleared", the matter at hand was discussed which showed that the Title I, and IA items on the Town Tax bills were for the maintenance of Town Roads and the reconstruction of Town Roads under the "Donovan Plan" which was formerly called the "Erwin Plan". It was further explained that these titles were all "lumped together" in previous years with the rest of the Town Taxes — but that this year they had been listed separately by the Computer Firm the printed up and computed the County and Town Taxes.

Thus Items 1, and 1A are not new tax items in the Town Budget—but actually a \$22.12 (approx. increase per \$ Thousand in the Town of Andover living outside the Village Limits.

There was a great deal of discussion over what caused this big jump in Taxes, what the money had been spent for, and what it was going to be spent for—with out arriving at any specific figures and amounts — or conclusions.

About this point in time, it was decided that there was a very pool line of communications and Public Relations between the Town Board and the Taxpayers and one Taxpayer asked why the minutes of the Town Board couldn't be given to the News Media for publication so the Public could be kept informed of actions taken by the Town Board. News Editor "Red" Allen stated that the Andover News would be willing to print the minutes of Town Board Meetings in their entirely if furnished copy—as is done with the Month of the Meetings of the Village and School Boards—to which Super-Howard Burdick promised About this point in time, it was To Weetings of School Boards Howard School Boards — to which Super-visor Howard Burdick promised that he would see that a copy of Monthly Meeting would be furn-ished for publication.


