More than 100 delegates from out of town represented the various Baptist Women's Mission Circle of Allegany Baptist which was held Wednesday at the First Baptist Church. Prizes were awarded for the best work done on Sewing and White Cross Work. Andover and Friendship Circles are the proud possessors of a Certificate each from the State Department of Missionary Education of the Northern Baptist Convention. The Andover Circle tied with the Friendship Circle in the Reading Contest and each received two Study Books and prizes. The Richburg Circle received one year's subscription to Missions for having the largest subscription, list to that magazine. After lunch Miss Julia Bent of South India Missions, addressed the group. After her address, the W. W. G. presented a play "Planting The Tree" which was very favorably received.

The Andover Village Board signed a contract with Niagara Lockport and Ontario Power Co. to purchase electricity for the use of Andover Village. The Niagara Company agrees to build a line connecting their main feed line with the village lines with all due diligence and have promised to get electricity to us for use yet this fall. The Niagara Power line is already completed to Wellsville. The following are the names of
