School Board Holds Special Meeting

A Special Meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School was called to order Monday, February 28, 1977. The following Board Members were present: Conner Stephens, Carl E. Atwell, H. Dale Green and Mary K. Slade; and District Principal, Curville R. Jordan.

A lengthy discussion was held on Management Recommendations. The following recommendations were acted upon:

Recommendation No. 8

When making a probationary appointment or an appointment for tenure the Board is required to include this information:

- (1) The name of the appointee
- (2) The tenure area or areas in which the professional educator will devote a substantial portion of his time.
- (3) The date of commencement of probationary service or service on tenure in each such area.
- (4) The expiration date of the appointment, if made on a probationary basis.
- (5) The certification status of the appointee in reference to the position to which such individual is appointed.

Motion was made by Carl Atwell and seconded by Conner Stephens that the above information be included in probationary and tenure appointments. Passed by 3 votes of yes.

Recommendation No. 41

That the board adopt rules and regulations for Petty Cash Funds so as to comply with Section 170.4 of the Commissioner's Regulations.

The Board of Education shall appoint Mr. Jordan as custodian of the Petty Cash Fund which has been established at \$100.00. That this fund shall be used only in payment of materials, supplies or services when payment is required upon delivery. The place of security of Petty Cash Funds shall be determined by Mr. Jordan.

Each payment from the petty cash fund shall be accompanied by an invoice — signed by the person receiving the cash or by a signed statement stating what the money was used for and the date of disbursement, the signature should be that of the person receiving the money and rendering the service.

Motion made by Conner Stephens, seconded by H. Dale Green passed by 3 votes of yes.

Recommendation No. 18

The Board of Education authorizes the district principal to certify payroll in conformance with Section 170.2 (b) of Commissioner's Regulations. Motion made by Conner Stephens, seconded by Carl Atwell, passed by 3 votes of yes.

Recommendation No. 17

That the Board of Education authorize the district principal to approve attendance at conferences, conventions, workshops, and other out-of-district activities as provided in Section 77-b of the General Municipal Law. Motion made by Carl E. Atwell, seconded by Conner Stephens, passed by 3 votes of yes.

Carl Atwell moved, Conner Stephens seconded that Job Descriptions for instructional and non-instructional positions were approved and filed with the minutes. Passed by 4 yes votes.

A discussion was held on a letter from Mrs. Mulconery. The letter will be filed with the minutes of the meeting.

H. Dale Green moved, Carl E. Atwell seconded, that terms of contract dated June 28th, 1976 for Mrs. Mulconery remain the same for the school year 1977-78. Carried by 4 yes votes.

The Board unanimously agreed not to fill the vacancy of Dr. Wm Walker at this time on the recommendation of the district Superintendent, Dr. Holowach, and to list the vacancy for general election at the Annual Meeting, May 8th.

Carl Atwell moved, H. Dale Green seconded, that the meeting be adjourned at 9:30 P. M. Carried by 4 yes votes.

Village Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees was held in the Village Office, Monday, January 10th at 7:30. Those present: J. Michael Brace, Mayor; Avery Mead, Karl Graves and Elmo Barden, Trustees.

Minutes of the Meeting held December 13th were read and approved on a motion made by Karl Graves and seconded by Avery Mead.

A communication was received from Attorney Argenti stating that the Citizens National Bank has agreed to purchase the bonds being issued for the sub-station on the following conditions: for the first 8 years the payment will be \$6000 per year, for the next 4 years the payment will be \$7000 per year and for the next 3 years the payment will be \$8000, for a total of 15 years. Also the interest is to be paid semi-annually on the first day of June and the first day of December of each year. The principal payment on the bond will be due on the first day of June.

Communication was received from our engineer Richard Moran in respect to correspondence with the Power Authority and trying to expedite the rate increase for electric in Andover.

Revenue Sharing funds in the amount of \$1638.66 was received for the first quarter of 1977.

Anti Recession funds in the amount of \$347.00 was received for the first quarter of 1977.

Avery Mead reported that the Police Department has been in contact with the Civil Service Office as to applicants for the Police vacancy.

Karl Graves reported that no word has been received from the E.D.A. as to the status of the application for funding for the Fire Hall emergency complex. A joint meeting of the planning boards will be held at 7:30, January 17th to investigate alternate means of funding.

A special meeting will be held January 24th in respect to the bonding of the sub-station.

Moved by Karl Graves and seconded by Avery Mead to investigate the County computerizing the Village Tax Roll and for the Village to appropriate the cost in the budget for the coming year.

Moved by Karl Graves and seconded by Avery Mead to accept the following Police Report for the month of December: Complaints, 14; Investigations, 6; Misc. Calls and requests, 3; Accident, 2; Doors and Windows found open, 0; Total arrests 3 (traffic 2; criminal 1); parking summonses issued 8; assists to other agencies 8; Property Checks, 1; Court Appearances, 4; Patrolman Bissell's hours 118; Patrolman Belmont's hours 141; mileage on patrol vehicle \$0,256 month of December 630. The following resolution was offered by Karl Graves and seconded by Avery Mead, who moved its adoption:

WHEREAS, the terms of J. Michael Brace, Mayor and Avery Mead and Harold Rice, Trustees expire on the 1st day of April 1977

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that there shall be held a General Election in and for the Village of Andover on the 3rd Tuesday of March 1977, in the Grange Hall, between the hours of 12:00 o'clock noon and 9 P. M. for the election of Mayor and Two Trustees.

The following resolution was offered by Elmo Barden and seconded by Avery Mead who moved its adoption:

WHEREAS, no person shall be entitled to vote at a Village Election whose name does not appear on the register of the election district in which he claims to be entitled to vote and,

WHEREAS, it is the duty of inspectors of election to prepare such register of qualified voters for the district for which they are appointed, and

WHEREAS, section 4-426 of the Village Law of the State of New York requires that there be one registration list for each General Village Election;
