"Inside The State Capital" By James L. Emery

How often have you heard the request "write to your Congressman or state representative?" I have the feeling that much of the public think such correspondence would be a waste of time and effort — that there would be no response and no attention paid to what the person is writing about.

On a state level, I know that in most cases, this is not true. Those of us who represent you in Albany not only have an obligation to seek the views of our constituents, but this is vitally important in order for us to function effectively. To illustrate my point, from time-to-time in these columns I will cite examples of correspondence or personal input I have received from residents in and around the 136th Assembly District which has been translated into legislation by me because I believe in the cause or feel it would be to the advantage of the public both locally and statewide for such a law to exist.

One of the best examples of this came to me in a letter from a constituent recently. Here is a portion of the letter:

"In reviewing my state sales tax records for the past year, I feel justified in complaining about my situation. As many families in our area, we are growing some of our own food. We have three dairy goats, a small flock of chickens, two hogs, each summer, and rabbits for meat. We grow a large garden, and plant more fruit-trees and shrubs each year.

"As the law has been explained to me, only that portion of animal feed, or seed which is used in farm production for sale is exempt from state and local tax. We raise food only for our family of six, selling only a few eggs a week, and we do not raise much of our feed at this time. So I pay 7 percent sales tax on all the feed, seed, and supplies for our small farm. This amounted to about \$60 in 1975.

"Had I bought eggs, chicken, pork, etc. in the grocery store, I would pay no tax because it is food. And I assume that the supplier for the store paid no tax on his feed, because he grows for sale. But I am taxed for growing my own. I can see no reason for it. The situation certainly does not encourage grow-your-own people in their efforts."

That person is exactly right, in my opinion, and as a result I have introduced legislation which would exempt from paying a sales tax on feed and seed those producers who engage in farm production and would not apply to animal feed for pets.

As the letter-writer points out, purchase of dog or cat food or feed for pleasure horses, is in the classification of a "non-essential" item needed because of pets. That is quite different from taxing those persons who are industrious and prudent enough to raise their own food for their own family. This bill (A-78) has been referred to the Assembly Ways and Means Committee because it involves the exemption of a state tax, but I hope it will be acted upon soon as I think it is an excellent concept which came about as a result of this person's letter to me.

In another case of a different nature, I have submitted a bill which would disqualify inmates or organizations of inmates from competitive bidding against private enterprise. This came about because of a letter I received late last year from an area businessman. He pointed out to me that an organization within a prison was selling municipalities, townships and counties signs to meet New York State Department of Transportation specifications in direct competition with his private firm which is in the same business.

He wrote in part, "We ask you help in getting this situation changed by not allowing these prisons to compete and bid against private enterprise. It is obvious they are working with cheap labor
