Maps of the proposed 18,699 acre agricultural district in the Towns of Greenwood, Hartsville, Canisteo, Jasper. Troupsburg and West Union were shown at a meeting last Tuesday night at the Greenwood Central School. The proposed district has been mapped by Mrs. Patsy Hulse and Mrs. June Sekoll. The project began about a year ago after a meeting in the Greenwood area when the agricultural district was explained. There was enough interest in the concept to start the mapping. Contacts were made by telephone and word of mouth and the two women held several sessions in the Greenwood Town Hall to talk with interested landowners and to map them in the district if requested. They vounteered much time.

The proposed district will be received to the Steuben. County

The proposed district will be presented to the Steuben County Board of Supervisors for considerations. They expect to complete all necessary work to present it at the April 18 meeting. It will be submitted to the County Planning Board and the Agricultural District Advisory Board for recommendation. After that a public hearing and action to approve or reject the proposed agricultural district by the Board of Supervisors. It will then be reviewed by the Department of Environmental Conservation. After review by the State Agricultural Resources Commission and the State Office of Planning Services the proposal if approved is returned to the County Board of Supervisors for final action. If approved, the district will continue without change for eight years.

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Steuben County Cooperative Extension Agricultural Agent, Wm Hudson of Bath, and Norman Clauson of Canisteo, members of the Agricultural District Advisory Committee, attended the Greenwood process. IT'S TIME TO STOP THE VIOLENCE

There is growing concern in our state over the increasing number of violent crimes being committed against all out citizens, particularly our elderly, and this concern is being reflected in the State Legislature. Recently legislation was inroduced of which I am a cosponsor designed to strengthen law enforcement against violert, terrorizing crimes. As a former sheriff, I have a keen interest ir solving our growing crime problem.

one might tend to think that One might tend to think that the built of these erimes are committed in the heart of the urbain shettos, such as New York City and while it is true that they have more than their shire, these victious acts occur in our society at all levels and in all areas.

The significance of the measure which I am co-sponsoring can be seen in he fact that it is also sponsored by all 62 minority members of the Assembly, including Minority Leader Perry B. Duryea. It is a comprehensive anti-crime

bers of the Assembly, including Minority Leader Perry B. Duryea.

It is a comprehensive anti-crime measure which would modernize our penal laws to properly deal with the vicious crimes prevalent today. It identifies those crimes of violence and sets appropriately stiff penalties. An illustration of the contrast between existing law and the new legislative proposal can be seen in a case where, for example, an offender sexually abuses a child and then proceeds to administer a vicious beating. This may not be tasteful to discussion that it is necessary to understand the point.

Under current law, two crimes would have been committed; sexual abuse in the first degree and, if the beating resulted in scrious injury, assault in the second degree both class D feicnies — and believe it or not the defendant could plead guilty to a misde meanor and be sentenced to probation.

Under the proposed law I am cosponsoring, however, the pleawould have to be at least a Class D felony and the sentence would nave to be at least a minimum two years imprisonment with a maximum term of at iear five years It is a case of providing an appropriate penalty and not just a legal textbook definition for the crimes cormitted.

It is high time all persons in New York State recognize that a strong policy of law enforcement is critical if our society is to be preserved. The problem we face now it that the wrong people are imprisoned. Our citizens are prisoners in their homes—not even safe there—while vicious criminals are returned to the streets through gaping holes in the law to prey upor us time and time again. When enacted, this bill will be a major step forward in the war on these hoodlums.

There is also a move in the Legislature to do something about violent crimes committed with a deadly weapon. This is why I are co-sponsoring Legislation in the Assembly which would mandate prison sentences for persons convicted of felonies in which fire arms are used or displayed.

This bill would apply to those

victed of felonies in which arms are used or displayed.

This bill would apply to those convicted of felonies in which a machine gun, firearm, rifle, or shotgun was used or displayed. The bill establishes a schedule of maximum and minimum sentences for those convicted, to be fixed by the court as follows:

— for a class B felony, the term must be at least nine years and must not exceed twenty five years:

five years: for a class C felony the term must be at least six years and must not exceed fifteen

and must not exceed the erm must be at least four years; and must not exceed sever years; and for a class E felony, the term must be at least three years.

must be at least three years and must not exceed four

years.

Persons convicted of armed felonies, would, under the provisions of the bill, be required to serve at least one half of the maximum term imposed.

It must be emphasized that this bill in no way restricts the right to own firearms, but rather is an attempt to provide a strong deterent to those criminals who use deadly weapons in the commission of ja crime. Since the provisions weapons in the commission rime. Since the provisions of a crime.

of the bill only apply to those con-victed of armed felonies, law abid-ing citizens who own firearms victed of armed resontes, law additing citizens who own firearms would not be affected. The mercase in violest crime has slarmed all our citizens and tough measures are called for to stem the rise.
