Mrs. Sharon Harkenrider, Area Cancer Chairman, reports about the work. "Did you know that 60% of the money collected by Steuben County for the Cancer Society stays in Steuben County. Some of the ways in which the money is used is to provide transportation or gas for the patient while he or she is going to doctors or having treatments. The Cancer Society also provides help at home with meals, housework, or helping to care for the patient. Doctors do not refer patients to us, they can only provide assistance when asked by the family or friends. The office closest to us is at 8 Seneca Street, Hornell. Regular workers to keep the office open are two Green Thumb Ladies, paid by a Farmers Organization. It is also staffed by volunteers who make out memorials for the family and the donors. Literature is available at the office and dressings and other necessary things are given out there. Volunteers do some sewing there or by groups. Last month they helped stuff the envelopes for the Cancer Crusade. About eight volunteers are going once a month to the Cancer office from Greenwood. It is open Monday through Friday 9 A. M. to 4 P. M. The other 40% of the money collected goes on for research.

"Inside The State Capital"

STATE BUDGET - EDUCATION & SEWAGE TREATMENT FUNDS

One of the Democrat aides to Speaker Stanley Steingut was quoted as saying during budget negotiations, "Welfare is ours and education is theirs". He was referring to the Democrat's push to restore cut welfare programs and the Republican's drive to restore education funds in the state budget.

With ineligibility levels reaching 11 or 12 per cent in New York City and elsewhere, Republicans have been focusing on cutting out the waste and fraud which easily accounts for 10 per cent of all welfare spending in New York State. Republicans are trying to redirect this money towards more positive programs such as education.

In his budget proposals, Governor Carey recommended that state aid to education be cut \$150 million. However, the Governor failed to show how the local governments could reasonably offset the loss in revenues without raising property taxes.

The funding of education through the antiquated system of property taxes must be changed, and we Republicans are pushing for the establishment of an education funding program which will stabilize property taxes and make greater use of the state's income tax revenues. Unfortunately, a lack of bipartisan cooperation killed this year's attempts to bring about the needed education financing changes. Nevertheless, state residents did gain a clear-cut victory when state aid to education was fully restored and the threat of drastic statewide property tax increases was eliminated.

State government recognized immediate financial responsibilities to local school districts and maintained necessary support levels. Aid for transportation services and BOCES were protected and the per pupil aid formula was actually increased to \$1,400 per student.

The one single thing that people continuously write to me about is, "Why isn't the lottery money being used for education?" People voted for the lottery because the revenues were going to education, and now are angry because this year, in the Governor's budget, the lottery funds are being channeled into the state's general fund for whatever Governor Carey feels is proper. The Governor's budget people say it is earmarked for education, but they wouldn't allow it to be put into state law. I think this is wrong, and I was forced to vote against the education budget because of it.

Another program where the voters were sold on one thing and now Governor Carey is trying to do another, is with the state's sewage treatment program. Voters were asked to approve a state Pure Waters Program, where the state would pick up one-third of the cost of cleaning up our streams, rivers and lakes. However, Gov-

ernor Carey, in his 1977-78 state budget, wanted the state to end its share of the costs for the program, leaving the local government to bear the full financial burden.

Again, this would be wrong, and the Legislature pushed for restoration of the sewage treatment funds. We were successful in gaining a partial victory. State funding over the next year will be one-quarter of the costs. I would like to have seen the full one-third funding level remain intact since that is why many localities became involved in the program. However, it's one more example of how the integrity of state government is being diminished and the credibility of Governor Carey has once more declined.
