After confirmation of the meeting policy, the Board went into executive session for nearly two hours to hear presentations. The people were satisfied with the method and sat waiting for the verdict. There was applause when the vote gave Yarnell tenure. The Board had other business and the people kept leaving as they had been mostly interested in the tenure. (Continued on Page 3)
