A plaque was presented to Paul Harkenrider and his son and daughter-in-law, Thomas and Sharon Harkenrider at the annual dinner of the County Soil and Water Conservation District Cooperators last week at Hammondsport.

District Chairman Howard DeMunn noted Paul Harkenrider has been a cooperator since 1950, when a conservation plan was developed for his 324 acre dairy farm in West Union. His son Thomas later joined him in the operation on which they raise pure bred Holstein cattle.

Some of the conservation practices done on the farm's 219 acres of cropland include: strip cropping of 176 acres during 1968, 1970, 1971 and 1974; building diversion ditches, and reforestation of 12 acres.

Election Commissioner Harry E. Keller and J. Harvey Backus of Andover had worked with the committee of 7 named by Chairman Frank L. Gere during the forenoon and reported tabulation of all but the vote cast on Presidential electors. The vote is for election of Lamke in the County thru writing in names after the barring of that ticket from the "counting machines in the state. Money was also provided for roads and snow removal of all roads outside the villages. Claire C. Backus Andover Publisher and Democrat member and Harry E. Keller, Cuba Attorney and Republican member, were nominated by the County Chairman of their parties as Commissioners of Election for four years. Mr. Backus succeeds his father, J. Harvey Backus and Mr. Keller succeeds himself after more than a dozen years service. The Board endorsed the nominations.
