A Special Meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School was called to order at 8:00 p. m., Tuesday, June 7, 1977 by President, Conner Stephens. Other Board members present were Mary K. Slade, Virginia Milligan and Paul McCormick. Others present were Mr. Curville R. Jordan and four guests.

A letter from Dr. Holowach was read re: Chairman and tellers for Budget meeting and voting.

Virginia Milligan made the motion and Paul McCormick seconded that the persons listed below act as tellers at the voting on the Budget on June 22, 1977. Passed by 4 yes votes.

Mary K. Slade made the motion that the Board go into Executive Session. Virginia Milligan seconded the motion. 4 ayes.

Letter received by Rita Sibble regarding the successful completion of seven weeks of her probationary period was read. Copy of this letter has been sent to Dale Dutton Civil Service Department.

Mary K. Slade made the motion that Richard Gill be appointed as a Substitute Teacher for a period of one year for Fourth Grade. Appointment will be effective as of September 1, 1977. Motion seconded by Virginia Milligan. Carried by 4 yes votes. Salary will be \$7,500.00.

Virginia Milligan made the motion that Lebra Bowen be appointed to a three year probationary period in the Elementary area — as a teacher in Kindergarten — appointment to be effective as of September 1, 1977. Salary, \$8,200.00. Motion seconded by Paul McCormick. Carried by 4 yes votes.

Conner Stephens made the motion to appoint Karen Copp to a three year probationary period beginning September 1, 1977. The tenure area of Foreign Language and English position will be Secondary Spanish and Secondary English. Annual salary will be \$10,540. Virginia Milligan seconded. Carried by 4 yes votes.

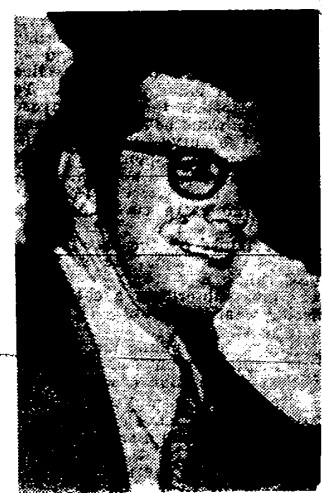
Mary K. Slade made the motion to release Carolyn Griffiths for 1977-78 School year to Coordinate K-12 Career Education Program.
