

## Village Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Village Board of Trustees was held in the Village Office at 7:30 April 11, 1977. Those present: Ralph A. Allen, Mayor; Fred Middaugh, Karl Graves, Charles Dain and Ann Appier, Trustees. Also present: Mike Smith, Ed VanStine, Leonard Coffin, Richard Schrader, Justice; and Merle Fox, Chairman of the Planning Board; and Rev. Francis Smozynski.

Minutes of the regular meeting held March 14th were read and approved on a motion made by Karl Graves and seconded by Charles Dain.

Minutes of the Special Meeting held March 28th were read and approved on a motion made by Charles Dain and seconded by Fred Middaugh.

Merle Fox, chairman of planning board, gave a report on the inspection of the bulk tainer building which was being considered as a site for a fire hall. This building was offered for \$130,000 plus the two building lots owned by the Firemen. After discussion the planning board decided to stay with their original plan of building on their own lot on the corner of 417 and 21.

Moved by Karl Graves and seconded by Fred Middaugh to have a brush and limb and bagged leaves pick up on April 18th.

Moved by Ann Appier and seconded by Charles Dain to have a trash (no garbage) pick up on April 25th.

Moved by Karl Graves and seconded by Charles Dain to have the Village employees keep a log book at the springs and reservoir to be signed daily when inspected.

A discussion was held concerning the dog situation in the Village. It was agreed to have the Mayor compose a letter to the Town Board asking for their cooperation in utilizing the Town dog warden, as the Village is in the Town and should have this service.

A correspondence was received from Philip MacMichael concerning a water valve box and curbing installed on his property. The water box will be corrected but the request for forgiveness on the curbing bill was tabled for 30 days for further investigation.

Moved by Karl Graves and seconded by Charles Dain that a request from Justice Richard Schrader for a filing cabinet be granted. Mr. Schrader was instructed to get prices on a suitable cabinet.

Mike Smith was present to request that a water curb box on his property on Barney St. be raised for better access. Also for the Village to remedy the newly installed water line to his property on 417, to prevent it from freezing again, also to raise the electric line into his property which runs under a tree pole also to fix a culvert which poses a dangerous situation.

Moved by Fred Middaugh and seconded by Charles Dain to accept the following police report for the month of March, as submitted by Randal Belmont. Complaints 12 Investigations 7 Misc. Calls and Requests 1, Accidents 0, Doors and windows found open 2, total Arrests 5 (traffic 3, village ordinance 2), Parking Summonses issued 51, assists to other agencies 2, Court Appearances 7, Patrolman Bissell's hours 137, Mileage on Patrol Vehicle 42,300, month of March 767 miles.

5. Lack of adequate records for poles, line transformers and meters.

6. Lack of electric system distribution maps.

7. Reasonableness of charges for jointly used buildings or facilities.

8. Review of charges for electric services furnished other Village departments.

9. Up-dating of service rules governing retail electric service.

10. Probable review of the general level of electric retail rates. (Completed), and

In order to keep the tax rate at \$40.00 which is a \$5.00 increase from last year, the majority of the Board felt that certain items should be decreased.

## The Mayor's Column

We are happy to report that progress is still being made as far as Village projects are concerned. All of the water services have been restored that were disrupted as a result of our past severe winter and, as far as we know, the immediate problems in that department have been corrected.

We have talked to several people from Con Rail and the North Main Street Crossing has been given temporary attention with cold patch. Getting it fixed up permanently may be an entirely different story - but, we are working on it!

As far as the dog situation is concerned, we attended a meeting in Belmont this past week with "Bill" Deming, our Town Dog Warden, that lasted until 11:30 p.m., that proved to be very informative and we were able to have all our questions answered.

Needless to say, we were pleased to find that our own Town Dog Warden was the only one present that had a badge for identification as well as having good knowledge of the Ag-Market Laws and the cooperation of Town and Village Officials.

Also for the information of all DOG OWNERS, the Rabies Quarantine is still in effect in Allegany County and more than likely will remain in effect for some time since Rabies has been found in some of the wildlife in the surrounding areas, with animals like Skunks, Possums, and Coons as well as Foxes being infected with this dangerous disease - an addition to Bats.

Under the Rabies Quarantine No Dogs are allowed to run at large either day or night unless on their owners property under his direct control or, on some one elses property with their permission - and under the direct control of some one. (This means on a leash - or some type of restraint).

We are also happy to announce that William Deming, the Town Dog Warden, will answer calls in the Village pertaining to dog problems such as dogs running loose, or menacing human lives. For dogs that are trespassing on neighbors property, it will be necessary for the complaints to sign a deposition so that legal action can be taken. However, if a person - man, woman, or child, is bitten by a dog or any wild animal - it should be reported immediately to the Dog Warden, a Health Official, or a Police Official and then a doctor should be consulted. In the case of a wild animal, it should be killed humanely - without destroying its head, and then it should be taken to a Vet so that he can send it in to the State Lab and be checked. If it is a dog, it has to be quarantined for 12 days to see if it has rabies. However, if the person is bitten anywhere, in the head, a different procedure has to be followed - but, be sure it is reported immediately!
